BELIEVERS OBEDIENTLY TRUST GOD

(REF/JOHN 3:16-18)

For those who are thirsting to <u>know</u> God's Word, and to have the Spirit of 'righteousness' <u>within</u> themselves, God's inspired Word informs the Christian, that only those who <u>believe</u> or trusts in His Son, will inherit Eternal Life. (John 3:16-17, says), "For so greatly did God love the world that He gave His only Son, that every one who <u>trusts</u> in Him may not perish, but may have the Life of Ages. For God did not send His Son into the world to judge the world, <u>but</u> that the world might be <u>saved</u>, <u>through</u> Him."

Our final judgment by the Son of God is pushed back to the end of one's life on earth, because the Son came to save the world from sin and death, and to give everyone the opportunity and privilege, to place their trust on Him for things in this life, and thus,... "be saved through Him", (as verse 17 says).

The Bible reveals that death is always <u>followed</u> by <u>judgment</u> (Hebrews 9:27-28), says, "And since it is <u>reserved</u> for all mankind once to die, and <u>afterwards</u> to be <u>judged</u>; so the Christ <u>also</u>, having been once offered in <u>sacrifice</u> in order that He might <u>bear</u> the <u>sins</u> of <u>many</u>,... will <u>appear</u> a second time, separated from sin, to <u>those</u> who are eagerly expecting Him, to make their salvation complete."

Jesus justified His authority to judge mankind for their <u>actions</u> in this life, (John 5:21-23), "For just as the Father awakens the dead and gives them life, so the Son also gives <u>life</u> to whom He wills. The Father indeed does not judge any one, but He has entrusted all judgment to the Son, that all may <u>honor</u> the Son, even as they honor the Father."

Jesus then explained, that <u>obedience</u> to the Son, <u>leads</u> to Life, (verse 24), "Most assuredly, I say to you, he who hears My word and <u>believes</u> in Him who sent Me", (<u>or</u>, "obediently <u>trusts</u> in Him", as John 3:16 <u>says</u>),... "has <u>everlasting life</u>, and shall not come into judgment, but has passed from death into life."

Jesus then <u>concluded</u> (verses 28-29), "Wonder <u>not</u> at this. For a time is coming when all who are in the graves will hear His voice and will come forth—they who have <u>done</u> what is <u>right</u>, to the resurrection of <u>Life</u>, and they whose actions have been <u>evil</u>, to the resurrection of judgment." (resurrection of <u>condemnation</u>)

So, the faithful believer wants to correctly define what it means to be a true believer, and to always <u>remember</u>, that God's <u>love</u> for mankind is always <u>there</u> for the <u>obedient</u> believer, as Jesus said, (John 15:10), "<u>If</u> you <u>obey</u> my commands, you will <u>continue</u> in my <u>love...</u> as I <u>have</u> obeyed <u>my</u> Father's commands and <u>continue</u> in <u>His</u> love."

Even though we may sin and be led astray from the life of Christ, and make wrong choices and decisions in our life, the love of Christ is still there for us to return to. The door is left open for one to return through confession and repentance to the life of Christ, to obedience and trust, and thus, to Christ's love, which is waiting for each one to return, and "continue in My love", (as Jesus said).

Jesus' words, confirm what God spoke through the prophet, (Malachi 3:7 says), "Yet from the days of your fathers you have <u>gone</u> <u>away</u> from My <u>ordinances</u> And have not kept them....'<u>Return</u> to Me, and I will return to you,' Says the Lord of hosts."

It is because of Christ's love for us that He wants us to return to trusting in Him after we sincerely confess our mistakes, and to be <u>found</u> to be trusting when we part from this life, or when He returns to take those HE finds obediently trusting, to be with Him in glory.

To be found trusting to the end of one's life, is most important, as Jesus emphasized to His followers, (John 6:29), "This," replied Jesus, "is <u>above all</u> the thing that God <u>requires</u>—that you should be <u>believers</u> in Him whom He has sent." From these verses in the gospel of John (chapters 3: 5: & 6:), we can realize that God only puts <u>one</u> condition on His Salvation Plan for people on this earth. That one condition <u>is</u>, to <u>be</u> trusting in His Son for things in this life, instead of placing our trust on other persons or things. (Savings accounts, insurance and pension plans, the medical profession, avenging wrongs done to us, safety devices, etc.)

The Bible reveals that Jesus <u>has</u> ascended and <u>is</u> at the right hand of His Father in Heaven, (where He <u>pleads</u> for the <u>Father</u> to <u>bring</u> <u>us back</u> to trusting in Him). (Hebrews 7:25), "Hence too He is able to <u>save</u> to the uttermost those who come to God <u>through</u> Him, seeing that He ever lives to plead for them."

God's only Son (resurrected <u>from</u> the dead <u>to</u> Life Eternal) is pleading to The Father, for us to be brought back to trusting in Him, so that <u>we may also</u> be <u>resurrected</u> to Life, <u>because</u> He loves us. In His great and never-failing <u>love</u> for us, God even promises to chastise= the Christian believer, who has <u>strayed</u> from, <u>His</u> will and plan for our <u>life</u> of <u>obedient</u> faith and <u>trust</u> in the Son of God. It is because of His mercy and love, and because He does not want any soul to perish, that God chastises the <u>believer</u>. (Hebr.12:5-6) "My <u>son</u>, do not think lightly of the Lord's discipline, and do not <u>faint</u> when He corrects you," (meaning do not lose your faith and trust in the Son of God in time of temptation, and begin placing trust in other places), (vs. continues) "for those whom the Lord <u>loves</u> He disciplines: and He scourges every son whom He acknowledges."

The <u>believer</u> in the Son of God is chastised by God when they stray from a <u>sincere</u> love and trust, <u>because</u> He loves us and He wants to perfect <u>our</u> love for Christ, <u>and</u> He wants our love for our <u>fellow</u> <u>man</u> to be <u>perfected</u>, (even toward our <u>enemies</u>), as Jesus told us. (Matt. 5:44-45), "But I <u>command</u> you all, <u>love</u> your enemies, and <u>pray</u> for your persecutors; that so you may <u>become</u>. <u>true sons</u> of your Father in Heaven; for <u>He</u> causes His sun to rise on the wicked as well as the good, and sends rain upon those who do right <u>and</u> those who do wrong." Jesus concluded in verse 48, "Therefore you shall be perfect, just as your Father in heaven is perfect."

So, as these verses reveal of our Father in Heaven, we are to be just like Him, <u>Who</u> sends His rain on the good and the bad. We are not condemn in our heart, those whom the devil and his agents have led astray and led into <u>unbelief</u> and <u>misplaced</u> trust. Rather, we are to show compassion and love, by praying for them and treating them with a Christlike love, when we happen to be in their presence.

In the same respect, we are not to <u>seek</u> the <u>company</u> of those who have been led into <u>unbelief</u> and <u>misplaced</u> <u>trust</u>, for the Bible classifies <u>unbelievers</u> as <u>idolaters</u>. Rather, we are to <u>come</u> <u>out</u> from among unbelievers (2 Cor. 6:14), "Do not come into close association with unbelievers", (15) "Or what participation has a believer with an unbeliever?" (16) "And what compact has the Temple of God with <u>idols</u>?" (17) "Therefore 'Come out from among them And be <u>separate,'</u> says the Lord. Do not touch what is unclean, And I will receive you."

[Trusting in other persons, things, and policies and plans of man, are all 'forms of idolatry'. God is the only One who can convict a person of 'misplaced trust'.]

So, we are to show compassion and love, by leaving them in God's hands, and praying for God to bring those who are led astray, to <u>return</u> to a life of obedience and trust, for God wants every soul to repent and to be found <u>trusting</u> in the end. (As the Scriptures reveal, Jesus followed up the assurance of John 3:16("Every one who trusts in Him may not perish"), by giving a 'solemn admonition' (John 3:18), saying, "He who <u>trusts</u> in Him does not <u>come up</u> for judgment. He who does <u>not trust</u> has <u>already</u> received sentence, <u>because</u> he has <u>not</u> his trust resting on the name of God's only Son." [Jesus did not leave any middle ground for one to dilly, dally, with the Truth that He was giving to us from His Father in Heaven.]

What the Bible <u>reveals</u> to us, <u>is</u>, that God's Salvation Plan is offered to <u>every true</u> and <u>faithful believer</u>, of whom each one has the free-will <u>choice</u>, to <u>trust</u> in His Son. It also reveals, that <u>for</u> everyone who <u>believes</u> that it <u>was</u> the Son of God who died on Calvary's Cross, and that He died to set us free <u>from</u> the <u>temptation</u> to sin <u>or</u> to <u>misplace</u> our trust (as the Holy Spirit empowers us to resist),... that each one will be given the <u>opportunity</u> and <u>privilege</u> to <u>trust</u> in God's Son, instead of <u>other</u> places of trust. God's Salvation Plan was predicted by His prophets many years before Jesus came to this earth to die for us, (Joel 2:32 says), "And it shall <u>come</u> to <u>pass</u>, That <u>whoever calls</u> (which means to believe or trust) on the Name of the Lord, Shall be <u>saved</u>."

So, the Christian needs to understand that it is a true belief or faith, in what the Son of God has accomplished for us on Calvary's Cross, (that is spoken of in these verses). It is getting rid of the self-life from our heart, and having a total faith in unseen things, believing we have received before we can actually see the answer to our prayers. Or to be fully trusting without compromise, on the

written promises of the God inspired <u>Words</u> of Jesus and the Prophets, as we are taught to heed by Christ's Apostles.

Jesus warns us <u>not</u> to be <u>lukewarm</u> in our faith or belief in Him (Rev. 3:16), "or I will spew thee from my mouth." He does not <u>leave</u> <u>room</u> for us to strain out the <u>assuring</u> verses that tickle one's ears and disregard His admonitions and warnings to remain in <u>obedient</u> faith to the end. Romans 8:1 (a verse that is many times twisted and misinterpreted), assures that there is no condemnation for those who are <u>in Christ</u>, (that means trusting)... <u>not</u> speaking of those who <u>have</u> believed... and then fell away from faith and into the <u>sins</u> of <u>unbelief</u>. (We should ask God to reveal to us, if we are unaware and unknowingly trusting in something or someone else, besides God.)

And Jesus <u>warns</u> those living in the sins of unbelief, not to be a <u>hindrance</u> to other believers, (Mark 9:42), "And whoever shall occasion the fall of one of these little ones who <u>believe</u>, he would be better off if, with a millstone round his neck, he were lying at the bottom of the sea."

As we consider this important truth of <u>Believing</u> (which is the <u>key</u> to receiving the <u>fulfilment</u> of <u>every written</u> promise in the Scriptures), it is necessary that we consider some <u>basic</u> <u>truths</u> of <u>Scripture</u>, to fully understand what it means to <u>be</u> a believer and be worthy to inherit that promise of Eternal Life.

We really need to define the words <u>believe</u> and <u>faith</u>, as well as the words <u>obedience</u> and <u>actions</u>. We cannot confuse faith and its corresponding actions with "<u>outward</u> works",... which mean <u>nothing</u> in the true Christian life. <u>However</u>, our freewill <u>choice</u> to <u>obey</u> or to <u>disobey</u> God's Word is <u>essential</u> in the true Christian's life of <u>faith</u> and <u>trust</u>, and this <u>freewill</u> <u>choice</u> cannot be <u>confused</u> with <u>outward</u> works the Apostle Paul spoke of.

The Apostle Paul, being raised as a Pharisee, was aware of (<u>after</u> he was convicted), just as Jesus was aware of, all the <u>outward works</u>, adornments, and <u>pious acts</u> that the Pharisees depended on to make them <u>feel</u> righteous. (As the late Pastor mentioned in a sermon lesson, (paraphrase) Some people think they have to have some <u>outward</u> experience in order make them <u>feel</u> righteous in themselves). However, the Holy Spirit's presence is within the <u>heart</u> of a person. Their life of trust is controlled by that Spirit in their heart and mind, and the results of the Spirit's work within, can be seen by their fruits (as Jesus said), or by their decisions and actions.

Paul could have used <u>many</u> examples to condemn the Pharisees many outward acts under the <u>old</u> law, to make them realize that their salvation in the <u>new Gospel plan</u>, could <u>only</u> come through the <u>grace</u> extended by Christ. However, he used circumcision as an example of their outward works because that was one of the most common and <u>main</u> <u>arguments</u> of the unbelieving Jews <u>against</u> the new faith (or <u>believers</u>) in Christ at that time.

In Romans 2:29, the Apostle Paul says, "But the true Jew is one inwardly, and true circumcision is heart-circumcision not literal, but

<u>spiritual</u>; and such people receive praise not from men, but from <u>God</u>." The Apostle said, (1 Cor.7:19), "<u>Obedience</u> to God's commandments is <u>everything</u>." (Not a dependence on any of the outwardly religious adornments or customs that the Pharisees of that day, or that anyone in this day may depend on to make them simply feel righteous.

The true believer's 'choice of the will' (as inspired by the Spirit), to obey God's Word and follow His plan, instead of one of the many plans of man (the seen things in life),... comes as a result of true faith and trust, or, true believing in God. This faith or hope in the unseen, is counted as faith righteousness for the true believer now, just as it was for Abraham.

Abraham <u>obeyed</u> God and departed from Haran, because He <u>believed</u> that God would bless and prosper him in the land to which He was sending him. (Genesis 15:6), "And he <u>believed</u> in the Lord, and <u>God</u> <u>accounted it to him for righteousness." Thus, we can see from the life</u> of Abraham (who lived even <u>before</u> the <u>Law</u> was given to Moses), that <u>obedience</u>, and <u>faith</u> to believe or trust,... <u>always</u> run hand-in-hand in the true believer's life.

The Bible does not separate obedient actions from faith, and neither can we. (James 2:17 says) "So also <u>faith</u>, if it is unaccompanied by <u>obedience</u>, has <u>no</u> life in it--so long as it stands alone."

Faith righteousness <u>or</u> faith to <u>obey God</u> and believe on His promises, as Abraham did, instead of <u>staying</u> in the land of Haran and <u>trusting</u> on the plans of the self-life, is brought out in Romans 4:16, <u>All</u> depends on <u>faith</u>, and for this reason — that, <u>acceptance</u> with God might be an act of <u>pure grace</u>. (Verse 24), "<u>Faith</u>, before long, will be <u>placed to</u> the <u>credit of us also</u> who are <u>believers</u> in <u>Him</u> who raised Jesus, our Lord, from the dead." Trusting on the Son of God (instead of following and relying on the many plans of man), is the only requirement (or condition) that God places on His Salvation Plan for people on this earth.

Blind faith in the words of Jesus (faith in the unseen <u>promise</u>) brought victory for the man we read of in John 4:50-51), "You may return home," replied Jesus, "your son has recovered." He <u>believed</u> the words of Jesus and started back home; and he was already on his way down when his servants met and told him his son was alive and well.

The faith to <u>obey</u> and <u>believe</u> God's Word to trust on His Son, not only carries with it the blessing in <u>this</u> life, but the promise of Eternal Life. (As John 5:24 reveals.)

Abraham's <u>obedience</u> to God's directions and his faith to <u>believe</u> God's promises, (regardless of the human (or seen) circumstances), was not considered as efforts of the flesh, but <u>rather</u> it was <u>counted</u> <u>unto</u> him as righteousness.

In just the same way, as <u>we</u> cannot <u>confuse</u> faith and its corresponding actions with <u>outward</u> <u>works</u>. A <u>true</u> <u>believer's</u> faithful obedience to God's Word, cannot be confused with <u>self</u> efforts <u>or</u> outward works of the flesh. The Israelites who <u>lacked</u> the <u>faith</u> to <u>obey</u> God's directions through Moses, also lacked the faith to <u>believe</u> (or trust) in God's promises. (Hebrews 3:17-19) "And with whom was God so greatly grieved for forty years? Was it not with those who had sinned, and whose dead bodies fell in the Desert? And to whom did He <u>swear</u> that they should <u>not</u> be admitted to His rest, if it was not to those who were <u>disobedient</u>? And so, we see that it was owing to <u>lack</u> of <u>faith</u> that they could not be admitted."

(Rom. 11:20 says), "It was their unbelief that cut them off, and you only stand through your <u>faith</u>."

The true believer would want to <u>strive</u> for the <u>faith</u> to <u>believe</u> and <u>remain</u> <u>obedient</u> to God's Word, no matter <u>what</u> temptation or circumstance confronts them, and strive for the faith to <u>believe</u> and be <u>counted</u> <u>righteous</u> in God's sight. As God <u>sees</u> our sincerity of heart, He will empower us <u>through</u> His Holy Spirit to <u>reject</u> every <u>plan</u> of <u>man</u> that Satan devises, and <u>not accept any plan</u> of <u>Satan</u>'s that could be trusted in, and possibly become an idol between us and God.

Paul said (Phil. 3:9), that he craved to "win Christ and be found in union with Him, not having a righteousness of my own, derived from the Law, but that which arises from faith in Christ—the righteousness which comes from God through faith. I long to know Christ and the power which is in His resurrection."

SOME MAIN POINTS OF "BELIEVERS OBEDIENTLY TRUST GOD": 1./The Son of God came to save the world, and to give us every opportunity to be <u>found</u> trusting <u>in</u> Him, before we are judged by Him in the end.

2./Because of God's love for us, He chastises the true believer, to bring each one to <u>perfection</u> in Christ (not just a lukewarm faith).

3./Obedience and faith are not 'works', and the Bible never separates them, rather, it is counted as <u>righteousness</u> unto the true believer today (just as for faithful Abraham).

4./Obedient `trust' on the Son of God, is the only <u>requirement</u> that God put on His Salvation plan for `true believers'. <u>"All</u> depends on faith," says Romans 4:16.
