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Deuteronomy 8:4 "Thy raiment waxed not old upon thee, neither did thy foot swell, these forty years. 5 Thou shalt also consider in thine heart, that, as a man chasteneth his son, so the LORD thy God chasteneth thee." It was a teaching opportunity for God—if they would listen and learn.

God's promises would be fulfilled—if they would be patient and persist in faith. Deuteronomy 8:7 "For the LORD thy God bringeth thee into a good land, a land of brooks of water, of fountains and depths that spring out of valleys and hills; 8 A land of wheat, and barley, and vines, and fig trees, and pomegranates; a land of oil olive, and honey; 9 A land wherein thou shalt eat bread without scarceness, thou shalt not lack any thing in it; a land whose stones are iron, and out of whose hills thou mayest dig brass."

Great blessings and a better knowledge of God result from keeping our faith in Him, and allowing Him to supply our need. We must *not* accept any other deliverance or substitute for God. Jesus told a parable AV Luke 18:1 "That men ought always to pray, and not to faint." He went on to tell about an unbelieving judge and a persistent widow who needed an answer from him. The judge kept putting her off, as he did *not* fear God and had *no* regard for anyone *else*.

He later says Luke 18:5 "Because this widow troubleth me, I will avenge her, lest by her continual coming she weary me." Jesus then tells her and us, 6 "Hear what the unjust judge saith. 7 And shall not God avenge his own elect, which cry day and night unto him, though he bear long with them? 8 I tell you that he will avenge them speedily." If we will persist in faith, He could deliver us in a moment!

The woman of Canaan needed healing for her daughter. The two points in *both* examples are to first *burn* any bridge back to self, and then use Scripture to *claim* our victory. The woman said Matthew 15:22 "Have mercy on me, O Lord, thou Son of David; my daughter is grievously vexed with a devil. 23 But he answered her not a word. And his disciples came and besought him, saying, Send her away; for she crieth after us."

Even though Jesus replied Matthew 15:24 "I am not sent but unto the lost sheep of the house of

Israel," she would not leave without an answer. 25 "Then came she and worshipped him, saying, Lord, help me." A second discouraging reply still did not change her persistence. 26 "He answered and said, It is not meet to take the children's bread, and to cast it to dogs."

He meant that the same relationship exists between the woman and Him, as between a strange man and a stray dog. *That* is the only basis she *had* for her claim—the right a stray dog has to beg something from a stranger. She says, Matthew 15:27 "*Truth*, *Lord: yet the dogs eat of the crumbs which fall from their masters' table.*"

The reply of the Lord to her then, is His reply to us today. Matthew 15:28 "O woman, great is thy faith: be it unto thee even as thou wilt. And her daughter was made whole from that very hour." She went home and found her daughter fully delivered. That faith and persistence in asking, is to be applied by us today.

We are to first make an uncompromising *decision* not to seek help from anyone but *God*, and then make our *claim* on the authority of His *Word*. The apostle said Romans 10:8 "The word is nigh thee, even in thy mouth, and in thy heart: that is, the word of faith, which we preach."

If we make a decision to *trust God* in faith, and to base our *claim* on the shed Blood of His Son, the victory *has* to be received—because God's power *has* to remain unchanged. <sup>2</sup> Corinthians <sup>1:20</sup> "For all the promises of God in him are yea, and in him Amen, unto the glory of God by us."

Wilderness wanderings can bring about marvelous *answers* to prayer—just like God did for His people during *Forty Years of Learning!*
