"GOD'S NEVER-ENDING MERCY" (IS ALWAYS EXTENDED TO US) The First-Century Gospel Church/Philadelphia

There are <u>encouraging</u> Scripture verses for everyone to consider, and so, comprehend their full <u>meaning</u> and <u>reality</u>, and which will enable us all to understand how far-reaching God's mercy really is (and can be) in the life of a <u>repentant</u> believer in God and His Son, Jesus Christ. When we consider that God's <u>Word</u> says, that He <u>delights</u> in mercy, <u>and</u> that God has already shown His greatest manifestation of mercy (inspired by the <u>nature</u> of the <u>love</u> in His heart for helpless mankind), then it should become a <u>humbling</u> and <u>encouraging</u> <u>realization</u> to take place in our <u>mind</u> and <u>heart</u>. It should inspire true believers to <u>repent</u>, and to <u>seek</u> God's mercy in every circumstance or situation we may face. (Micah 7:18) re-assures a repentant person that God does not retain His anger forever, Because He delights in mercy.

We can be inspired to <u>praise God</u> and <u>repeat</u> the words of (Psalm 107:1-3) "Oh, give thanks to the Lord, for <u>He is</u> good! For His mercy endures forever. Let the redeemed of the Lord <u>say so</u>, <u>Whom He has</u> <u>redeemed</u> from the hand of the enemy, And <u>gathered</u> out of the <u>lands</u>, From the east and from the west, From the north and from the south." (Romans 5:6 says), "For already, while we were <u>still</u> <u>helpless</u>, Christ at the right moment <u>died for</u> the <u>ungodly</u>." (That is the <u>true</u> <u>definition</u> of the <u>extent</u> of God's divine mercy toward us!)

So, we want to have a real <u>understanding</u> of what Jesus Christ's <u>Atonement sacrifice</u> on Calvary's Cross has <u>accomplished for us.</u> It is not only that, by the <u>Mercy</u> of God the <u>repentant believer</u> has <u>received</u> <u>pardon</u> and <u>cleansing</u> and <u>forgiveness</u> from sins previously committed in their life, <u>but</u> that His shed <u>Blood</u> is the <u>power</u> that <u>supports every</u> <u>other promise</u> of God's mercy to <u>be</u> <u>shown</u>, in behalf of those who <u>will</u> <u>place their trust on His promises</u> to <u>show</u> His mercy.

The Bible says that God's Mercy is <u>Everlasting</u>, and it is a <u>standing offer</u> of mercy that has <u>never been removed</u> (and is always <u>extended</u> to <u>those</u> who will <u>seek</u> and <u>believe</u> to receive it. So, the <u>sooner</u> we would confess our sins and mistakes to God and <u>seek</u> His mercy in a true spirit of <u>repentance</u>, the better it will be for us spiritually. It will enable us to <u>benefit</u> from God's mercy, as we have benefitted, even while still living in sin.

We can <u>remind</u> ourselves that every breath we have ever breathed in our body has been <u>through</u> God's mercy. Can we even <u>imagine</u> how merciful God will be to <u>us</u>, <u>if</u> we would <u>seek</u> <u>Him</u> with a <u>repentant</u> <u>heart?... when we know that He</u> is <u>waiting</u> to <u>show mercy</u>, <u>because</u> He delights in showing His mercy!

2 Cor.1:3 reminds us that <u>God</u> is the <u>Father</u> of mercies <u>and</u> the God of all <u>comfort</u>, (and God's Promises and His <u>Word</u> <u>about</u> <u>Himself</u> are

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always <u>true</u> and <u>faithful</u>). So, we must remember <u>who</u> the <u>Father</u> of <u>mercies</u> <u>is</u>,...(that, <u>He</u> <u>is</u> God, <u>Himself</u>), and that <u>He</u> <u>will</u> <u>hear</u> our <u>call</u> for mercy if we will turn to Him with a truly <u>repentant</u> <u>heart</u>. God's divine order and plan is to be followed by <u>everyone</u> which is, <u>repent</u>, be baptized in <u>the Name</u> of <u>Jesus</u> <u>Christ</u>, believe that you are forgiven, and receive the gift of the Holy Spirit (as Peter explained to the disciples of the early Church (Acts 2:38). With the <u>free gift</u> of the Holy Spirit given to inspire a repentant believer, one should be willing to repent and seek God's never-ending mercy.

Many past sermon messages have given <u>examples</u> of how God's mercy was extended to King David as soon as <u>he repented</u> and <u>called for God's</u> <u>mercy... also</u> King Manasseh, who did evil in the eyes of the Lord, following the detestable practices of the nations, (2 Chron. 33:). King Manasseh showed no mercy, and he murdered people for no reason, deliberately <u>rejecting</u> the Lord's way and totally <u>serving</u> the <u>devil</u>. But the moment he <u>sincerely repented</u> and <u>called</u> on God for His mercy, <u>God's</u> mercy was given him.

That extent of God's never-ending mercy toward a <u>repentant</u> sinner, is also shown by the example of King David, who was guilty of a couple most serious sins (which would have taken him to the Lake of Fire <u>if</u> he had not <u>genuinely</u> <u>repented</u>).

However, King David was of a truly <u>contrite</u> and <u>repentant</u> spirit, as he confessed and then pleaded with God (Psalm 51:1-3) "Have <u>mercy</u> upon me, O God, According to Your loving-kindness; According to the <u>multitude</u> of Your tender mercies, <u>Blot</u> <u>out</u> my transgressions. Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity, And <u>cleanse</u> me from my sin. For I acknowledge my transgressions, And my sin is always before me."

<u>That is the path of sincere repentance</u> for everyone else to take, since we have Aall sinned and fallen short of the glory of God.

In that prayer of <u>repentance</u> King David openly <u>confessed</u> his <u>sins</u> before God. He <u>acknowledged</u> his <u>transgressions</u>, and then pleaded with God (vs.10-11), "Create in me a <u>clean heart</u>, O God, And <u>renew</u> a <u>steadfast</u> spirit within me. Do not cast me away from Your presence, And do <u>not take</u> Your <u>Holy</u> <u>Spirit</u> from me. He pleaded (vs 14) Deliver me from the guilt of bloodshed, O God, The God of my salvation."

His <u>salvation</u> <u>depended</u> <u>on</u> getting back to God right with a <u>repentant</u> <u>spirit</u>, and King David <u>knew</u> that. He realized that he had to <u>sincerely</u> <u>forsake</u> the sins previously committed in his life. He said (Psalm 51:17) "The sacrifices of God are a broken spirit, A broken and a contrite heart-- These, O God, You will not despise."

And God <u>did</u> <u>not</u> despise King David because of his terrible sins, <u>nor did he revoke His offer</u> to <u>show mercy to</u> the repentant, ...rather, God was waiting to extend His mercy (because He is a loving God). So, just as with King Manasseh, <u>God's</u> mercy was shown to King David the moment he sincerely repented and called on God for His mercy.

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Apostle <u>Paul</u> <u>admitted</u> that he had been the worst of sinners, and that he had <u>persecuted</u> true <u>believers</u> of his time, <u>before</u> God <u>extended</u> <u>His 'offer of mercy'</u>, and brought Saul to <u>repentance</u> (when he was <u>willing</u> to repent). The Bible says of 'Saul' (Paul's name <u>before</u> his <u>true repentance</u>), that his every breath was a threat of destruction for the disciples of the Lord. <u>And</u> if he found any believers (either men or women), he might bring them in chains to Jerusalem. However, <u>God did not despise</u> Saul because of his terrible sins, instead, in His great mercy He gave Saul an <u>opportunity</u> to repent. <u>After</u> his <u>willingness</u> to <u>repent</u> and <u>receive</u> God's <u>mercy</u>, and he <u>had learned by</u> <u>experience</u> in a life of trust, <u>who</u> the Father of mercies <u>is</u>, ... Paul proclaimed in his letter to the Corinthians, "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of mercies."

Paul realized that he (the worst of sinners as he said), had been <u>spared by God from condemnation to</u> the <u>Lake of Fire</u>. He now <u>understood</u> that <u>God is constantly trying to deal with human beings</u> to <u>bring</u> <u>conviction</u> in them. Also, that God does not despise them because of their sins (even though the <u>majority rejected</u> and <u>crucified</u> His <u>Son</u> when He was sent to this earth with God's <u>Message of Salvation</u>). Paul realized that God has <u>continually tried</u> to <u>advise mankind</u> from <u>the</u> <u>Truth of His Word</u>, but that people will <u>not repent</u> (and <u>many</u> do <u>not want anything to do with God</u>). "Yet, while we were still helpless, Christ at the right moment <u>died for the ungodly</u>." (Rom. 5-6). That was God's <u>greatest gift to mankind</u>, as a <u>manifestation of His mercy</u> for us.

God's mercy extends further, even though <u>most people</u> on earth <u>have rejected Him</u> and <u>His</u> <u>Son</u>. (Rom.8:31-32) "What then shall we say to this? If God is on our side, who is there to appear against us? He who did <u>not withhold even His own Son</u>, but gave Him up for all of us, will He not also with Him <u>freely give us all</u> things?"

That <u>should be</u> a real <u>inspiration</u> <u>for faith</u> on our part, that we can place our needs and requests before the one and only God, who gave His Son to die for us, while we were still sinful. When <u>Paul</u> realized this about God, he <u>exulted</u> <u>in praise</u> to Him (vs.36) "For <u>of</u> Him and <u>through</u> Him and <u>to</u> <u>Him</u> <u>are</u> <u>all</u> <u>things</u>, to whom <u>be</u> glory forever. Amen."

He explained for the sake of <u>others</u> (Rom.11:29-32) (and <u>speaking</u> of God's never-ending mercy), "For God does not <u>revoke</u> (nor <u>recall</u>) His <u>free gifts</u>, <u>nor</u> of <u>His call</u>; but just as you (Gentiles) were formerly disobedient to Him, but now have received mercy at a time when they (Jews) <u>are disobedient</u>, so now they also have been disobedient at a time when you are receiving mercy; so that <u>to them</u> too there <u>may now be mercy</u>. For God has locked up all in the prison of <u>unbelief</u>, that upon <u>all alike</u>, <u>He may</u> have <u>mercy</u>." It is <u>our</u> freewill choice to believe in real faith on the Son of God, and seek His mercy, <u>or</u> to reject Him (our Lord and Savior) Who <u>is</u> the <u>only</u> way to Heaven.

"Yet it was their <u>unbelief</u> that cut them off" (Rom.11:20 explains), "and you only <u>stand</u> through your <u>faith</u>." (Vs. 23) "And they also, <u>if</u> they do not <u>continue</u> in <u>unbelief</u>" (<u>trusting in man and his</u> <u>plans instead of God</u>, they also) "will be grafted in, for God is able to graft them in again." (The <u>repentant soul will be grafted in again</u>, because it is the <u>nature</u> of God's love and His desire to show His mercy to <u>every repentant</u> soul). (Matt. 12:20), "A crushed reed He will not utterly break, nor will He quench the still smoldering wick, until He has led on Justice to victory."

Having been a <u>recipient</u> of God's <u>mercy</u>, Paul exulted <u>with</u> praise for God, and he concluded (Rom.11:36) "For of <u>Him</u> and <u>through</u> <u>Him</u> and <u>to Him</u> are all things, to whom be glory forever. Amen."

What he meant was, that <u>God</u> has done everything for His people, <u>even those who hate Him</u>, people who are against Him, even when they spurn His mercy and throw it to the winds. Even toward <u>those who</u> <u>crucified His Son</u>, does His mercy still extend, and He has waited almost two thousand years for them to repent, so that He can receive them back again, as His chosen people. God is still waiting for Israel to come to the place where they will say, "<u>Blessed is He Who</u> comes in the name of the Lord!" (Psalm 118:).

God is <u>waiting</u> for those who crucified His Son, to <u>receive</u> the <u>mercy</u> that He <u>still</u> <u>extends</u>, for them to <u>repent</u> and <u>return</u> to His mercy, because He <u>wants</u> <u>not</u> <u>one</u> <u>soul</u> to perish. (2 Pet. 3:9).

Under <u>human</u> <u>law</u>, the cold-blooded rejection and murder of the Son of God (an <u>innocent</u> person), there would be <u>no</u> mercy shown, rather, the <u>penalty of death</u> would <u>await</u> the murderers. But, in the second chapter of Acts, <u>God</u> inspired Peter to address <u>those</u> <u>who</u> had <u>mocked</u>, <u>falsely accused</u>, and put to death God's only Son, by nailing Him to a Cross, by saying to them (vs.22) "Ye <u>men of Israel</u>, <u>hear these</u> words".

God had inspired Peter to <u>address</u> <u>them</u> <u>as</u> <u>`Israelites'</u> and give them 'words of <u>Truth'</u> that <u>could</u> <u>bring</u> <u>them</u> <u>to</u> <u>repentance</u> <u>if</u> <u>they</u> <u>would</u> only <u>use</u> <u>their</u> power of <u>choice</u> to <u>accept</u> it. God <u>did</u> not <u>despise</u> the very <u>people</u> <u>who</u> had <u>killed</u> <u>His</u> <u>Son</u>.

(Wording from Weymouth translation says (vs.22-23) "Listen, '<u>Israelites'</u>, to what I say. <u>Jesus</u>, the Nazarene, a man accredited to you from God by miracles and marvels and signs which <u>God</u> did <u>among</u> you <u>through Him</u>, as you yourselves <u>know</u>, Him (delivered up through God's settled purpose and foreknowledge), <u>you</u> by the hands of Gentiles have <u>nailed to a cross and have put to death</u>."

God still addressed them as <u>Israelites</u> (His own people), and they were <u>admonished</u> <u>instead</u> <u>of</u> being <u>despised</u>. He reminded them (vs36) "Therefore let the whole House of Israel know beyond all doubt that God has made Him both LORD and CHRIST, this <u>Jesus</u> whom you crucified." God inspired Peter to tell them in clear language, that you are those people, who falsely accused the Son of God, and you chose to set a murderer free instead of Jesus (the innocent One), and you then killed Him. It was you who did this terrible crime (he admonished them). Yet, we want to take note that to those who did accept that admonishment, and who were willing to repent, he immediately extended His offer of mercy through His plan for their salvation.

Many of the listeners <u>realized</u> that Peter was telling them the <u>truth</u> about <u>themselves</u>, (vs.37) AStung to the heart by these words, they said to Peter and the rest of the Apostles, "Brethren what are we to do?" "<u>Repent</u>," replied Peter, "and be baptized, every one of you, in the name of Jesus Christ, with a <u>view to</u> the <u>remission</u> <u>of your</u> <u>sins</u>, and you shall receive the <u>gift</u> of the <u>Holy</u> <u>Spirit</u>." (Acts 2:38). (God's mercy is never-ending, and everlasting, for those who will humble themselves to repent and seek His mercy).

That is all the punishment those people were to receive for <u>their</u> <u>terrible</u> <u>crime</u> of <u>murdering</u> the <u>Son</u> of <u>God</u>, an <u>admonishment</u>, and a <u>plea</u> for them to <u>repent</u> (for they <u>like</u> <u>us</u>, were <u>created</u> <u>as</u> free-moral agents, and given the power of choice to make <u>right</u> <u>decisions</u> <u>to</u> <u>turn</u> <u>to God</u> <u>in</u> <u>faith</u>). God's <u>merciful</u> <u>plan</u> to help them, was to <u>invite</u> them to <u>repent</u>. However, <u>if</u> they (and <u>others</u>) <u>will</u> only <u>truly</u> <u>repent</u> and turn to God in <u>faith</u>), He <u>promised</u> (and God does not recall promises), that they will receive the <u>gift</u> of the <u>Holy</u> <u>Spirit</u>. (Rom. 11:29 says), "For the gifts and the calling of God are irrevocable."

Those people (just like ourselves) were given the <u>opportunity</u> to use their <u>power</u> of <u>choice</u>, to receive God's <u>mercy</u>, as well as to receive the gift of the <u>Holy Spirit</u>, who is given to true believers. The <u>world is full</u> of <u>two kinds</u> of people, <u>believers</u> in Christ, and <u>unbelievers</u>,... and the <u>Holy Spirit</u> is only given to <u>believers</u> in Christ. (John 14:17) "<u>That Spirit</u> the <u>world cannot receive</u>, because it <u>does not see</u> Him or <u>know Him</u>. You know Him because He remains by your side and is in you."

It <u>is that</u> Holy Spirit who <u>sanctifies</u> and <u>prepares</u> each believer to be <u>ready</u> (the <u>living and the dead-in-Christ</u>), (ready) to <u>meet</u> God's Son (who was <u>the first to rise from</u> the dead). The <u>Holy Spirit</u> will <u>inspire faith</u> in the <u>true believer</u> which will enable them to <u>obey</u> God's Word, because they have true <u>love</u> for <u>God</u> and believe <u>on</u> His <u>Word</u>. (John 14:14-16 says), "If you make any request of me in <u>my</u> <u>Name</u>, I will do it. If you <u>love</u> me, you will <u>obey</u> my <u>commandments</u>. And I will ask the Father, and He will <u>give</u> you <u>another Advocate</u> to <u>be</u> for <u>ever</u> with you—the <u>Spirit of Truth</u>." (which <u>unbelievers cannot</u> receive).

So, our merciful <u>God</u> is <u>still</u> <u>waiting for</u> <u>the</u> <u>rest of</u> <u>Israel</u> (and <u>all of mankind</u>), to use their power of choice right, and to <u>choose</u> to truly repent and seek His mercy, (which is still extended to each one

who will turn away from sin and unbelief), which (Paul explained) is <u>idolatry</u>). It is the same mercy that God extended to King Manasseh, King David, Saul of Tarsus, and to many others. The <u>testimonies</u> of these <u>repentant people</u>, and of <u>how God</u> (in trueness of His merciful character) <u>received them back into His arms</u> with <u>rejoicing</u>, ... should be an <u>encouragement</u> to every human being, and we should not <u>allow</u> Satan to ever <u>make us doubt the mercy of God</u>.

Some people may like to suggest that we <u>could go on sinning</u>, however, the longer we would go on sinning, the longer the devil will have a hold on us, and we <u>will hinder God's mercy</u> from <u>being shown on</u> <u>our behalf</u>. We <u>cannot</u> 'sin with <u>immunity'</u>. We would indeed be forsaking the <u>mercy of God</u>, that <u>is always extended</u> for a <u>repentant</u> <u>soul</u> who will <u>turn from sin</u> and <u>unbelief</u>, and so, <u>come to believe in</u> <u>Christ</u>, Jesus. That very mercy of God will <u>lead us to repentance</u>, <u>if</u> we have sincerely <u>surrendered</u> the actions of <u>the self life</u>, rather, to <u>believe</u> on the <u>power</u> of the <u>Atonement</u> work of Jesus Christ on <u>our</u> <u>behalf</u>. (Acts 10:43) assures the believer, "To Him (the Christ, Jesus), all the Prophets <u>bear</u> witness, and <u>testify</u> that <u>through His</u> <u>Name</u> all who <u>believe</u> in Him receive the <u>forgiveness</u> of their sins." [That means <u>Salvation</u> for everyone who endures in the faith, ... and <u>what could be</u> of more <u>importance</u> to anyone than that.]

God will rejoice to receive each truly repentant sinner who will seek His everlasting mercy, and the free gift of the Holy Spirit will be given them, for God does not take back His free gifts. Then the truly repentant soul will proclaim with joy (as in Psalm 118:23-24) "This was the Lord's doing; It is marvelous in our eyes. This is the day the Lord has made; We will rejoice and be glad in it.".

SOME MAIN POINTS EMPHASIZE THAT:

 In God's supreme love for us, He delights in showing His mercy to us, that is why it is always extended for those who seek His mercy.
God rejoices to receive truly repentant sinners, who will seek the never-ending mercy that He extends to everyone who will follow His divine order and plan repent and believe,...and, the free gift of the Holy Spirit will be given them, for God does not revoke His free gifts, (it must be our choice to receive them).

3. (Most importantly), "God already displayed a <u>greatest</u> <u>manifestation</u> of <u>mercy</u>, when He sent His only Son, Jesus Christ, Who at the 'right moment' died for the ungodly." (Rom. 5:6).
