"STEPS TO OUR SUCCESS IN THE CHRIST LIFE"

'Believing' God's Word about what Jesus Christ (His Son)
accomplished for us on the Cross at Calvary, is what enables us to
have the privilege of being pardoned and cleansed by His Atonement
Blood. We must believe for that Pardon and Cleansing, the same as we
are to believe for everything else in our 'life of trust' (on the Son
of God). It is the beginning (and the first step) toward success in
the true Christian life, but our 'Pardon and Cleansing of Sin' is only
'one step'. We are to strive toward our goal (the Apostle said), "with
my eyes fixed on the goal, I push on to secure the prize of God's
heavenward call in Christ Jesus." (Phil. 3:14).

Believing God's 'Salvation Message' to obey and trust on His Son (a message that was sent through Jesus), enables a person to accept it (if their heart is 'willing' to accept it). It should inspire a person to repent of their sins, and make the 'choice' to sincerely commit themselves to follow Christ, surrender the self-life to God, and to be 'born again' of the Spirit. (Believing God's Word that we are pardoned and cleansed by the shed Blood of His Son, repenting, in order to be 'born again' of the Spirit and making a sincere commitment to having God's will accomplished in our life, ... (are the first steps toward success in the true Christian life). Jesus said, "Except a man be born again, he cannot see the Kingdom of God." (So, that means these steps are very necessary for our Eternal Life.)

It is through the sanctifying work of the 'Holy Spirit' (received from God by a truly repentant soul), ... that the nature of 'self' is removed from our heart. The removal of 'self' is the third step, and the 'most important' thing that must take place (in the life of every believer). Without the guidance and work of the Holy Spirit to remove the self-life from the person's heart, they would not be ready for Eternal Life.

Accepting God's <u>Message</u> into one's heart, allows for the indwelling of the <u>Holy Spirit</u> to take control of every action and decision in their life. It is the work of the indwelling Holy Spirit that removes 'self', <u>sanctifies</u> a person, and prepares them <u>through</u> an obedient <u>faith</u>, to be worthy of Eternal Life. Paul said that <u>Jesus</u> had instructed him (Acts 26:18) "I send you to open their eyes (Jews and Gentiles), that they may <u>turn</u> from darkness to light and <u>from</u> the <u>obedience</u> to <u>Satan</u>, to <u>God</u>, in order to receive <u>forgiveness</u> of sins and an inheritance, among <u>those</u> who are <u>sanctified</u> through <u>faith</u> in Me."

So, in a letter to the Romans, Paul explained God's Message about what the sacrifice of His Son would mean to everyone who <u>believed</u> on the cleansing power of His Atonement Blood. (Rom.3:25-26) "He it is whom God put forward as a Mercy-seat, <u>made effective through faith</u> in His Blood, in order to demonstrate <u>His</u> righteousness— <u>because of</u> the

passing over (in God's forbearance), of the sins previously committed", "to demonstrate— <u>His</u> righteousness, and be shown <u>as</u> the <u>giver</u> of <u>righteousness</u> to <u>those</u> who 'believe' in <u>Jesus</u>." (27-28) "Where then is there room for your boasting? (human pride excluded), "It is forever shut out. On— the <u>ground</u> of <u>faith</u>. For we maintain (Paul said) "that it is <u>as</u> the <u>'result</u> of <u>faith'</u> that a man is held to be righteous."

(Gen. 15:6 says), that "Abraham 'believed' God," (thus, he was able to act in faith), "and $\underline{\text{this}}$ was placed to his credit as righteousness."

So, we can see how important it is for a person to truly 'understand' and believe God's Message about the redeeming work that His Son accomplished for us on Calvary's Cross. It is the whole basis for our faith. That realization is what enables a person to place trust on the Son of God for things in this life (to be confident that we can trust on Him to prepare us for Eternal Life), and so, be "among those who are sanctified through faith in 'Me'." (as Jesus said).

It can be the beginning of having the <u>perfect conditions of</u> the <u>Garden of Eden restored</u> in our life here. Most <u>importantly</u>, our realization and belief on what Christ accomplished by His Atonement sacrifice, enables God to prepare us for the Kingdom of Heaven. It will enable the <u>Holy Spirit</u> to <u>remove</u> the <u>nature</u> of <u>'self'</u> from our heart (that third and most important step toward success in a true Christian life) and <u>replace</u> that nature of <u>'self'</u> with divine nature.

In human matters if we don't believe a <u>word</u> which tells us what someone of something can do), we would have no reason to put our confidence on that person or thing (to <u>accomplish</u> <u>anything</u> for us). Our <u>faith</u> will always be in what we <u>believe</u> about something.

It is the <u>same principle</u> involved in truly <u>believing</u> God's <u>Message</u> about <u>what</u> His Son's work on the Cross has <u>already</u> <u>accomplished</u> for us. The power of Christ's atonement Blood <u>covers</u> <u>everything</u> in the true Christian 'life of trust', and <u>that</u> is what we must all come to realize. When a person turns their <u>dependance</u> to a <u>human source</u> of help (or deliverance), it is saying, that they <u>really don't believe</u> on the power of the atonement Blood of Jesus Christ (even though one may be <u>saying</u> that they believe).

God's 'Salvation Message' is, that our sins have been pardoned and cleansed. The great work of Jesus Christ pardoned every sin that we or anyone else ever committed. He bore the guilt of us all; paid one hundred per cent for it, to totally dismiss everything that God could have against us.

The sacrifice of Jesus Christ's <u>life</u>, pardoned, cleansed, and purged us <u>from</u> our sins (so we need not go back to them). He is the lamb slain to <u>pay</u> the price <u>for</u> sin, from the creation of the world. There is a total pardon <u>from sin</u>, <u>from</u> the time that Adam fell until <u>now</u>. The sacrifice of His life <u>acquitted us</u> of every sin we ever committed, (if we will <u>sincerely confess</u> them to God, when those sins are revealed to us). The only thing that Jesus is pleading for us to

<u>do</u>, is to be <u>willing</u> to <u>admit</u> and <u>sincerely</u> <u>confess</u> our sins and mistakes, and turn our <u>life</u> <u>back</u> <u>to</u> <u>Him</u>, so that the Holy Spirit can do what <u>God</u> <u>promised</u> to do for us. "When He is come, the Spirit of Truth, He will guide you into all the Truth." (says John 16:13).

To receive that acquittal <u>from</u> sin, we are to give our life back to God, which is to <u>re</u>consecrate our life to Him with faith that <u>He</u> (through the Holy Spirit) will <u>guide</u> us in living an <u>'overcoming'</u> 'life of faith' (on the Son of God). (To each of seven Churches (Rev. chapters 2 & 3), <u>Jesus told John to write</u>; "He who <u>overcomes</u>", "and scrupulously <u>obeys</u> my commands, I will give authority over the nations;" "He shall in <u>no way</u> be hurt by the second death." To him who 'overcomes', "I will give him the privilege of <u>eating</u> the <u>fruit</u> of the 'tree of <u>life</u>'" (which is in the paradise of God)."

That is the promised inheritance for those who turn their life back to God (a 'baptism of repentance' (the Apostle said), to receive the Holy Spirit and believe on the Atonement work of Jesus Christ), and so to receive acquittal from sins that are confessed to God, "the passing over (in God's forbearance) of the sins previously committed".

That acquittal is a <u>free</u> gift! Something we <u>must</u> <u>believe</u> <u>is</u>, that we <u>have</u> a Blood-bought <u>right</u> to have our sins pardoned, because the <u>Scriptures</u> tell us, "<u>He</u> was wounded <u>for</u> <u>our</u> transgressions." That means His body was broken and Blood shed to '<u>forgive</u>' us forever. (We <u>must</u> <u>believe</u> to <u>accept</u> <u>what</u> His atonement work already did <u>for</u> us).

Jesus <u>'invited'</u> us to <u>accept</u> that 'state of forgiveness' and <u>'peace'</u> that He purchased for us, (Matt. 11:28), "Come to Me, all you who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest." Jesus was referring to our lives here; and that everything will become restful when we 'come to Him' (in faith) to find <u>peace</u>. (29) "Take My yoke upon you and learn from Me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls."

Paul said it in this way (Rom.12:1) "I <u>plead</u> with you therefore, <u>brethren</u>, by the compassion of God, to <u>present all</u> your faculties to Him (meaning our <u>entire</u> body), as a <u>'living</u> and <u>holy</u> sacrifice', acceptable to Him. This with you will be an act of <u>reasonable</u> worship." (That <u>full surrender</u> of <u>'self'</u> is what Jesus meant, when He said, "Come unto Me".) When the Apostle Paul wrote the words of (Rom. 12:1-2), he had discovered how merciful God is toward <u>everybody</u>. When the Jews <u>refused</u> God's <u>blessing</u>, He turned to their worst enemies (the Gentiles) and gave the blessing to them.

A Jew (trained in Judaism) would know what Paul meant \underline{by} 'a living Sacrifice'. A Sacrifice placed on the Altar of God was usually a slain animal, and the moment it was placed there, the Altar of God sanctified(purified) it. Nobody would have dreamed of removing it. It was given to God finally and forever (they would never take it back!

That is what Paul meant by a 'living sacrifice' (wholly and totally committed to do <u>God's</u> will). However, his letter was written to <u>encourage</u> (and to <u>admonish</u>) the <u>Gentile</u> Christians living in Rome, (as he had done Rom. 11:), and telling them not to boast, because they

had been grafted in, in the place of the Jews who had $\underline{\text{fallen}}$ $\underline{\text{away}}$ from faith in God.

It is important to understand that he told the Gentiles (which would include us), to present themselves, as a 'living sacrifice', (instead of offering a 'dead animal sacrifice'). By a 'living one', he meant, we are to commit ourselves completely to do God's 'will'; and to acknowledge that He is to be our Ruler and our Guide in everything. All that we are asked to do, is to place ourselves under God's control so His Holy Spirit can sanctify (and purify) us. We must give ourselves to God the best way we know how, for His will to be done in our life. We are to be assured that the Holy Spirit will always help us when we are willing to make a final commitment to do God's will in our life.

The Apostle admonished (Rom. 12:2), "And do not follow the customs of the present age, but be transformed by the entire renewal of your minds, so that you may learn by experience what God's 'will' is—that 'will' which is good and beautiful and perfect." (That means to be "Holy and acceptable unto Him which is your reasonable service." (which means a 'willingness' (on our part) to follow His Word and the guidance of the Holy Spirit. A willingness is what God is looking for in everyone's heart, then the Holy Spirit can do the necessary work of sanctifying a person and preparing them for Eternal Life).

It is only reasonable to think that anybody whom God has created, (anyone whom He has pardoned with the Blood of His Son, anyone that God wants to make happy and victorious over trouble (and to prepare them for Eternal Life), that He should have <u>full possession</u> of them. They should be <u>fully committed</u> to doing God's will regarding <u>every circumstance</u> of their life. For one to get to Heaven, God's Word says, we should <u>present</u> ourselves as a 'living sacrifice' unto God, receive the Holy Spirit, and then become "holy and acceptable unto Him".

God always gives the Holy Spirit, the moment our lives are surrendered to Him. If it were possible, He would take possession of us without the surrender of the 'self-will'. But He can't do that because it is a <u>free gift</u> that <u>we must choose to accept</u>. We <u>all</u> have a free-will <u>choice</u> (to either <u>accept</u> or <u>refuse</u> the gift of the Holy Spirit), to <u>take</u> the <u>place</u> of 'self' in our heart.

The Holy Spirit is like the sunshine, which does not get in if we pull the shades down or close the curtains, but the sun does shine in when we raise the shades or open the curtains, ... so it is with the Holy Spirit, when we make a final surrender that we want to do God's will in our life.

The moment we present our body as a living sacrifice to God, the Holy Spirit comes in (whether we realize it or not). That is what it means "to be holy and acceptable unto Him, which is our reasonable service." (Rom.12:1).

Psalm 37:5-6 says it differently, but it $\underline{\text{means}}$ the $\underline{\text{same}}$. "Commit your way to the Lord, ' $\underline{\text{Trust}}$ also $\underline{\text{in}}$ $\underline{\text{Him}}'$, And $\underline{\text{He}}$ shall bring it to

pass. He shall bring forth your <u>righteousness</u> as the <u>light</u>, And your justice as the noonday."

(Paraphrased, today's English), "put yourself and everything that you <u>want done</u> in <u>God's hands to stay</u> (from the least to the greatest issue,) and <u>allow Him</u> to do it for you. <u>Depend</u> on <u>Him</u> alone to do it. (That would be "trusting also in Him".)

It means to give our life to God once and for all time, like a worldly person would sign a contract for a builder to construct a new home for them. It means to give God the job of doing whatever we would like to have done in our life, whether it be spiritually, the health of our body, God's peace and control in our home, or anything else. Our commitment to have God accomplish everything in our life, is the 'second step' toward a successful Christian life. It is only a step, however.

There were people in Bible times who were <u>once filled</u> with the Holy Spirit, (had the <u>gift of prophecy</u>, <u>lived the Truth</u>), but <u>went</u> to the <u>Lake of Fire</u> (not knowing they were heading there). King Saul was anointed by the prophet and lived a life of <u>trust on God</u> (in some areas of his life, and in his reign as King). However, he didn't complete the <u>third</u> (and most important) step of getting rid of 'self' from his heart. And he did <u>not</u> succeed <u>through</u> those efforts of 'self'. He didn't go all the way <u>with God</u>, by fully <u>obeying His Word</u> through the prophet, and King Saul <u>lost</u> the <u>Spirit</u> of God. He ended his life in suicide.

That third step, (getting rid of the 'self-life' through a new birth in Christ) "is the most important thing". Without it, the other two steps (although also important steps), are of no value. We must be definite about allowing the Holy Spirit to take 'self' from our heart, and to replace it with the 'divine nature' of Jesus Christ. Everything in our life here and ever after, depends on our getting rid of the self-will that we were born with. It is a work that must be completed within our heart. Eternal life will depend on how the third step is attended to (or dealt with).

Most denominational Churches do not really know about the 'new birth (and have never heard of having the <u>self-life</u> removed and being <u>perfected</u> in <u>the Truth</u>, (or the true Christian life of <u>faith and trust</u> on God for every part of life). Except for <u>quoting</u> Scriptures, "they have gotten away from the true <u>teaching</u> of <u>the Bible</u>" (and away from <u>trusting God</u> for all things in their life). "A person such as that still has an evil nature."

They believe that if a person joins their Church, attends services, puts a few dollars in the offering box, and is a decent, <a href="https://outward.com/outward.

"Most evangelical Church ministers don't even \underline{know} to \underline{ask} a person, "have you received the Holy Spirit since you believed?" Or

have you been <u>born</u> <u>again</u> of the Spirit and <u>pardoned</u> and <u>cleansed</u>?" (Nor to ask: is the <u>Holy Spirit</u> <u>taking</u> the <u>nature</u> of <u>self</u> from your heart?) The ministers $\underline{don't}$ <u>say</u> that a person has to <u>take</u> these three important steps (nor meet the three easy conditions to get to Heaven).

"When we consider that a person who goes to the <u>Lake of Fire</u> (through <u>false</u> religion), <u>never</u> gets out, and that a <u>drop of water</u> on the tip of their tongue would be a relief", "we must say, <u>that</u> is <u>serious</u>." "And yet, <u>no Christian</u> with even common sense, would accept such a thing" as those <u>false promises</u> being given by denominational church ministers).

The third step in the true Christian life, is the main point of God's teaching and dealings with someone who has surrendered their life to do His will, and that is for God to perfect people in the Truth" (by having the self-life removed from their heart). Also, to the extent that we are perfected in the faith, God will bring others into His Truth. King David said in his prayer of repentance, "Create in me a clean heart, O God. Renew a right spirit within me."

In summarizing the message (the late Pastor said), "many other people can be convicted and brought to repentance through you and I living the Truth.in our life. Husbands and wives, (children and parents), will act right and be brought (by God) into the Truth. I have (personally) seen one person accept the Truth right, and their entire family would come to God's Truth (even large numbers outside of their families accepted the Truth), through seeing a Christian light shine through right actions and decisions of others).

"That is the way God will always work!!"

MAIN POINTS:

- 1. God's divine plan is for people to hear His Word, believe it, take it to heart and repent, and to be baptized. We then must believe that we <u>are</u> pardoned and <u>cleansed because</u> of the 'redemption' provided in the atoning shed Blood of 'God's Son, Jesus the Christ whom He sent to this earth to redeem us from our sins.
- 2. A person then must also believe that they are being sanctified by the work of the Holy Spirit, and so, being "born again' of the Spirit" (as Jesus said that we must be), and which will enable us to make a sincere commitment and consecration of our life to Christ.
- 3. <u>Most importantly</u>, the nature of the 'self-life', <u>must</u> be removed from our heart (by the sanctifying work of the Holy Spirit), because our Eternal Life will <u>depend on how this third step</u> is attended to (in our 'life of faith' "believing on the One whom God has sent") (which is the only pathway that will lead us to Eternal Life).
