## "THE <u>CHARACTER</u> OF <u>GOD</u>" (IS "<u>NEVER-ENDING MERCY</u>")

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The Mercy of God is a wonderful topic and an encouraging subject for anyone to take time to consider, even though thorough explanation is really beyond ever putting into words. As one would meditate on God's <u>mercy</u>, we may come to realize that it cannot be fully explained, but the <u>Holy Spirit</u> will help a person to <u>understand</u> and <u>relate</u> to God's Mercy in their own mind. We may <u>try</u> to express it our own way, by saying, that mercy is to help someone who does <u>not deserve</u> help (as God did for us by sending His Son to give <u>His</u> life <u>for us</u>, even though we were undeserving sinners at the time.)

Forgiveness, grace, and compassion are good synonyms of mercy, and each one truly illustrates some part of God's character. "Wherever I show mercy, it shall be nothing but mercy, and wherever I show compassion it shall be simply compassion" (says Rom.9:15). And (Vs.18 reminds us), that wherever He <u>chooses</u> He <u>shows</u> mercy, and wherever he chooses He <u>hardens</u> the heart."

Therefore, it is not by <u>our</u> will and endeavor, for God is "all in all" (the Bible teaches). Instead, it is through His <u>mercy</u> that we receive mercy, when we meet the <u>only condition</u> that God placed on His <u>will</u> for us... that is, to <u>"believe"</u> on His <u>Word</u> (through His Son), and thus, seek Him in faith. (Rom.11:22 also reminds us), "<u>Notice</u> therefore God's <u>kindness and</u> God's severity. On those who <u>have fallen</u> His severity has descended, but upon you His <u>kindness</u> has come, <u>provided that</u> you do not <u>cease to respond</u> to that <u>kindness</u>. Otherwise, you will be cut off also." This is (vs.33), "in agreement with the statement of Scripture, "See, I am placing on Mount Zion a stone for people to <u>stumble</u> at, and a rock for them to trip over, ... and <u>yet</u> he whose <u>faith</u> rests upon it shall <u>never</u> have <u>reason</u> to feel <u>ashamed</u>."

As God enables us to understand how <u>merciful</u> He really is, it will <u>inspire</u> us with <u>confidence</u> to not only go to Him to <u>receive</u> our <u>deliverance</u>, but to go to Him in the first place and <u>ask</u> in faith for what we need. That is the <u>real result</u> of us coming to <u>understand</u> the <u>Mercy of God</u> (and of <u>believing</u> and <u>accepting</u> it as it is given). When we consider the real <u>meaning</u> of (2 Cor.1:3), "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the <u>'Father</u> of Mercies' and <u>'God</u> of all Comfort'", we can start to realize <u>how great His</u> <u>'mercy' really is</u> and begin to make practical applications of it toward needs and requests.

When <u>Scripture</u> says, 'the <u>Father</u> of <u>mercies</u>', that should mean to us that God <u>cannot</u> <u>be</u> <u>anything</u> <u>other</u> <u>than</u> <u>merciful</u> (under any condition and circumstance that we would seek mercy from Him) because His nature <u>compels</u> Him to <u>show</u> <u>mercy</u> toward us. It is the part of our Heavenly Father's character that is waiting for us to <u>seek</u> and <u>find</u>, if we will only <u>turn</u> to <u>Him</u> in faith through <u>believing</u> that God's Word is true, and that He is faithful to fulfill it.

In <u>contrast</u> to the Father of <u>Mercy</u> and <u>Truth</u> who is always faithful, <u>Jesus</u> told us that <u>Satan</u> is the '<u>father</u> of <u>lies'</u>, which means he cannot do <u>anything but</u> tell <u>lies</u>, as it is impossible for him to <u>tell</u> the truth. That is important for us to remember, since the devil is constantly suggesting things to our mind, that '<u>seem</u>' to be truthful, ... (but the 'father of lies' (the devil) <u>cannot</u> be truthful. If we are not careful and <u>watchful</u> (as Jesus <u>warned</u> us), we may find ourselves to be putting some credibility on what the <u>devil</u> is trying to have us believe and accept. However, there is no excuse or reason for us to believe that there is <u>any</u> truth to the devil's suggestions to our mind (when we <u>know</u> that God's <u>Word</u> has told us the opposite).

We must also remember that the '<u>Father</u> of <u>mercies'</u> is "God", and so <u>rely on His Word</u> instead of the devil's suggestions). God's Promises and His Word about Himself, are always <u>true</u> and <u>faithful</u>. The <u>mercy</u> that we should seek from God, is just as much a part of His character as <u>is 'love'</u> (and we all <u>know</u> from 1 John 4:) <u>God is Love</u>). God's mercy springs <u>from</u> His love and <u>compels</u> Him to <u>show</u> it on behalf of those who <u>seek help from</u> <u>Him</u> (our '<u>Father</u> of <u>Mercies</u>'), (instead of turning to man and his devices which are designed by the <u>sinful</u> nature).

In <u>human</u> affairs, the worst criminal would still have the mercy of their parents' love for them. The <u>parental</u> <u>love</u> of the criminal's parents will always reveal <u>their</u> mercy, as they try to find excuse for him. They almost always believe that there must be a misunderstanding concerning the crime committed.

Parents who desire to have God convict their children (and be brought to <u>repentance</u> and <u>salvation</u>), will surely hope and <u>pray</u> for their children to repent (even if they are down to their last breath), <u>because of the mercy</u> that comes from a <u>human love</u> in their heart. Because of <u>mercy</u>, husbands and wives will plead with each other <u>to</u> <u>repent</u>, even if the other does not profess to be a Christian. <u>God</u> has placed that mercy in hearts of humans, although it is blemished because of the sinful nature and Satan's power over the unrepentant.

What is the Father of mercy actually like? Could we even imagine how kind and merciful He will be to us, if we would seek Him with a repentant heart, because we know that He is waiting to show mercy (and He delights in showing mercy?) (Micah 7:18) "Who is a God like You, pardoning iniquity, and passing over the transgression of the remnant of His heritage? He does not retain His anger forever, Because He delights in mercy."

If we will take that verse to heart and <u>believe</u> that God <u>delights</u> in mercy, then we should realize that He is waiting and longing to <u>show mercy</u> toward <u>us</u> (just as His Word tells us).

The late Pastor used an analogy about his <u>delighting</u> to do something, saying, "When I was a boy I would argue and coax my mother to give me fifty cents for a ticket to attend a local event because I had a <u>delight</u> to go to that event (and it was also much better than washing dishes or running errands). So, I would not have appreciated it if someone would keep me from going somewhere I <u>delighted</u> to go."

That is what we want to realize about our merciful God, and that He delights and finds pleasure in showing His mercy toward a repentant person who will sincerely and openly confess their sins to Him in prayer and seek his mercy. It is surely a part of God's Scriptures that we should want to have a real understanding of, for it will encourage us to always 'seek mercy' from the 'Father of Mercy', Himself. God's never-ending mercy toward the repentant sinner is clearly expressed in the Bible example of King David, who had committed a terrible sin, by having a man murdered and then taking his wife (the sins of both murder and adultery), which would have taken King David to the Lake of Fire if he had not truly repented). (Rev.21:8), "But as for cowards and the unfaithful (unbelievers), and the polluted, and murderers, fornicators, and those who practice magic or worship idols, and all liars--the portion allotted to them shall be in the Lake which burns with fire and sulphur. This is the Second Death."

However, King David was of a <u>truly contrite</u> and <u>repentant spirit</u>, as he said in (Psalm 51:1-3) "Have <u>mercy</u> upon me, O God, According to Your loving-kindness; According to the <u>multitude</u> of Your tender mercies, ... <u>Blot out</u> my transgressions. <u>Wash me thoroughly from my</u> <u>iniquity</u>, And <u>cleanse me from my sin</u>. For I <u>acknowledge</u> my transgressions, and my <u>sin</u> is always before me." (That is the <u>pattern</u> of sincere <u>repentance</u> for everyone to follow), in that we have "all sinned and fallen short of the glory of God" (as Rom.3:23 admonishes us).

A <u>repentant</u> spirit that is <u>sincere</u> (as was King David's), is what <u>enables</u> us to <u>obtain</u> God's merciful <u>forgiveness</u> and <u>His righteousness</u>, <u>through faith in the cleansing power</u> of the Atonement <u>Blood</u> of Jesus Christ. (Rom. 3:21 says), "But now a righteousness coming from God has been brought to light apart from any Law," (vs.22) "a righteousness coming from God, which <u>depends</u> on <u>faith</u> in Jesus Christ (<u>and</u>, <u>that</u> His Atonement Blood has cleansed us), "and extends to all who believe."

We are to (and must) <u>truly believe</u> (as King David did), that <u>because</u> of God's great <u>mercy</u>, He is <u>compelled</u> to (and will) <u>pardon</u> those who <u>sincerely confess</u> and <u>repent</u> before <u>God</u> of their mistakes. That is <u>what</u> Jesus Christ's <u>Atonement Blood</u> accomplished for each of <u>us.</u> (Vs.25) "<u>He</u> it is whom God put forward as a <u>Mercy-seat</u>", (that is) "rendered efficacious <u>through</u> faith in His blood, in order to demonstrate His righteousness because of the <u>passing</u> over, in <u>God's</u> forbearance of the sins <u>'previously'</u> committed,". It is (vs.26 says), "with a view to <u>demonstrating</u>, at the <u>present</u> time, <u>His</u> <u>righteousness</u>, that <u>He</u> may be <u>shown</u> to be <u>righteous</u> <u>Himself</u>, and the <u>giver</u> of righteousness to those who believe in Jesus." King David openly <u>confessed</u> his <u>sins</u> before God in his <u>prayer of</u> <u>repentance</u>. He <u>acknowledged</u> <u>his</u> <u>transgressions</u>, and he pleaded with God (Psalm 51:10-11), to "Create in me a <u>clean</u> <u>heart</u>, O God, and <u>renew</u> a <u>steadfast</u> spirit within me. Do not cast me away from Your presence, and do <u>not</u> <u>take</u> Your <u>Holy</u> <u>Spirit</u> from me." He pleaded "Deliver me from the guilt of bloodshed, O God, The God of my salvation."

King David <u>knew</u> that his '<u>Salvation'</u> <u>depended</u> <u>on</u> <u>getting</u> <u>back</u> <u>to</u> <u>God</u> <u>right</u>, with a '<u>repentant</u> <u>spirit'</u> which had <u>sincerely</u> <u>forsaken</u> the sins previously committed in his life, especially the sin of bloodshed for which he pleaded for deliverance <u>from</u> that <u>guilt</u>. (His plea to God continued (vs.16-17), "For You do <u>not desire</u> sacrifice, or else I would give it; You do <u>not</u> delight in burnt offering. The <u>sacrifices</u> of <u>God</u> <u>are</u> a broken spirit, A <u>broken</u> and a <u>contrite</u> heart <u>These</u>, O God, You will not despise."

King David was <u>made</u> <u>right</u> with <u>God</u> through '<u>repentance'</u>, for God <u>did not despise him</u> for his terrible sins, <u>rather</u>, God was <u>waiting</u> to <u>show mercy</u>, <u>because</u> He <u>delights</u> in <u>showing mercy</u>. (Matt.12:20), "A crushed reed He will not utterly break, nor will He quench the still smoldering wick, until He has led on justice to victory."

God will give us all the <u>opportunity</u> to repent, before we are cut from the Vine, <u>because Mercy</u> is the <u>character of God</u>. Each day we are given opportunity to sincerely <u>repent</u> and <u>forsake</u> our mistakes and sins, <u>renew our commitment</u> and <u>consecration to God</u>, and <u>renew</u> our 'life of faith', as we kneel in prayer by faith at the feet of Jesus Christ and <u>place all</u> circumstances in our life before Him <u>in</u> <u>faith</u>. (Rom.11: 20-23 explains), "yet it was their <u>unbelief</u> that cut them off, and you <u>only stand through</u> your <u>faith</u>. Do not be puffed up with pride. Tremble rather--for if <u>God did not spare</u> the <u>natural</u> <u>branches</u>, <u>neither will He spare you</u>. Notice therefore God's <u>kindness</u>, <u>and God's severity</u>. On those who have <u>fallen</u> His severity has descended, but upon you His <u>kindness</u> has come, <u>provided that</u> you <u>do</u> <u>not cease</u> to <u>respond</u> to that kindness. <u>Otherwise</u>, you <u>will</u> be <u>cut off</u> also. Moreover, <u>if</u> they <u>turn from</u> their <u>unbelief</u>, they too will be grafted in. For God is powerful enough to graft them in again."

King David poured his heart out to God in private devotions to Him, and he was given the opportunity to repent, confess, and forsake his sins, and he was grafted in again (because God <u>delights</u> to show mercy). He gave his testimony of <u>thanksgiving</u> to <u>God</u>, after he was pardoned, cleansed, and <u>restored</u> to health. As King David <u>sincerely</u> <u>repented</u>, God <u>delighted</u> to show His mercy to him. (Psalm 103:1-4 is his testimony), "<u>Bless</u> the Lord, O my soul; And all that is within me, <u>bless</u> His holy name! Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all His benefits: Who <u>forgives</u> all your iniquities, Who <u>heals</u> all your diseases, Who <u>redeems</u> your <u>life</u> from destruction, Who crowns you with loving-kindness and tender mercies."

King David was <u>referring</u> to deliverance from <u>sickness</u> and troubles of every kind, by saying "Who <u>heals</u> all your diseases, Who <u>redeems</u> your life from destruction", (because he had been afflicted by a very serious sickness that had threatened to take his life). He <u>praised</u> our <u>merciful</u> God for <u>pouring</u> <u>out</u> <u>His</u> <u>Mercy</u> on him, when he said, "Who crowns you with loving-kindness and tender mercies." (Because God delights in showing mercy).

If King David had been dealing with <u>men</u> instead of dealing with God, he would not have received <u>any</u> deliverance. Instead, he would have been put to death because no mercy would have been shown to an adulterer and murderer. It is important that we understand, that when he was <u>willing</u> to <u>turn from</u> those sins and <u>openly</u> and <u>sincerely</u> <u>confess</u> them, God showed His loving kindness and tender mercy toward a <u>repentant soul</u>. Those circumstances (regarding King David's situation) should <u>help</u> us to <u>understand</u> how <u>far</u> God's mercy <u>extends</u>, and how <u>longlasting</u> it can be, for <u>anyone</u> who is willing to <u>repent</u> before the Lord (because <u>they fear</u> God). (Psalm 103:11 says) "For as the heavens are high above the earth, so <u>great</u> is His mercy toward those who <u>fear</u> Him" (and <u>obey Him</u> by doing His will). (Vs.17-18) "But the mercy of the Lord [is] from everlasting to everlasting, on <u>those</u> who fear Him, And His <u>righteousness</u> to <u>children's children</u>, too such as keep His covenant, and to those who remember His commandments to do them."

We should also take note that God's Word says, His <u>mercy</u> is "from everlasting to everlasting", because the <u>devil</u> would like to make us believe that <u>God's mercy will not last</u>. The devil does not want us to understand that God's mercy is infinitely and eternally <u>on those who</u> will <u>fear Him</u>. <u>However</u>, <u>God's Word</u> tells us, that no matter what our sinful condition <u>has been</u> (nor what our present condition is),...if we are willing (there is <u>our freewill choice</u>), are <u>willing</u> to go to God in an honest prayer of repentance, and sincerely confess our true sinful condition to Him and ask for His mercy, (the moment that we do), His mercy is always <u>waiting to be extended</u> to us.

The only <u>exception</u> to <u>God</u>'s offer of <u>everlasting mercy</u>, <u>is</u> if one were to blaspheme (curse) the Holy Spirit of God. (Matt.12:31 Jesus said), "Therefore I say to you, every sin and blasphemy will be forgiven men, but the blasphemy <u>against</u> the Spirit <u>will not be</u> forgiven men. (We are <u>never</u> to <u>grieve</u> the Holy Spirit of God, by cursing <u>about</u> <u>Him</u>).

God's everlasting <u>mercy</u> is a standing offer of mercy that has <u>never been removed</u>, and it will <u>last as long as we need it</u>. So, the <u>sooner</u> we would confess our sins and mistakes to God and seek His mercy in a true spirit of <u>repentance</u>, the better it will <u>be for us</u> <u>spiritually</u>, and it will enable us to <u>benefit from</u> God's mercy. It is through <u>God's mercy</u> that we <u>continue</u> to <u>exist</u> on earth, for we never breathed a breath in our body that was not extended by His mercy.

So, what must the <u>Father</u> of mercy be like? Could we <u>even</u> <u>imagine</u> how <u>kind</u> <u>and</u> <u>merciful</u> He will be to us, <u>if</u> we would <u>seek</u> Him with a <u>repentant</u> heart, when we understand that He is <u>waiting</u> to <u>show</u> <u>mercy</u>, because He delights in showing mercy? Each of twenty-six verses in Psalm 136 end with the words "For His mercy <u>endures</u> forever." That is not just needless repetition, rather, it is to help us understand that <u>God's mercy never ceases</u> to be there for anyone at any time. God, in His great <u>mercy</u> (to save our <u>soul</u> from being condemned), will <u>chastise</u> us for our sins and mistakes to <u>bring repentance</u> (and <u>for that we should be thankful</u>). (1 Cor.11:32) "But when we are judged by the Lord, chastisement follows, to <u>save us from being condemned along with the world</u>."

We are to <u>seek</u> God's <u>mercy</u> and <u>forgiveness</u> for our <u>known</u> <u>sins</u> (and any other sins that God reveals), as we kneel before Christ in a prayer of <u>sincere</u> confession and repentance (just as King David did when he was chastised by God's mercy for terrible sins he committed).

<u>God's forgiveness is always there for us</u>. We just need to return to Him in a <u>spirit of true</u> repentance, because His mercy is always extended, and it is from everlasting to everlasting.

God has already showed us His greatest manifestation of mercy, and it was inspired by the <u>nature</u> of <u>love</u> in His heart. (Rom.5:6), "For already, while we were <u>still</u> <u>helpless</u>, Christ at the right moment <u>died</u> for the <u>ungodly</u>."

(That is the true definition of God's Divine Mercy).

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## The First-Century Gospel Church/Philadelphia

MAIN POINTS:

<u>MERCY: IS GOD'S CHARACTER</u>, explains how willing God is to deliver us, and that we should be very <u>confident</u> of receiving the <u>victory</u> (when we go before Him in prayer), and truly <u>believe</u> that He will <u>answer</u> our request.

2. The example of God's mercy in answer to King David's <u>plea</u> for His mercy, is used, to help us realize how <u>far</u> God's mercy will extend in the life of a <u>repentant</u> person, who truly <u>forsakes</u> their sins and mistakes.
