"TRUE FAITH IS ACTIVE FAITH"

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For many years among professed Christians, there have been numerous and varied opinions when trying to discern the difference between 'outward works' and an 'active faith' (on God). A true Christian should understand that difference between 'actions of faith', and that of mere outward acts of a self-life (which have no spiritual value nor merit). In contrast, 'an acting faith' can be the difference between victory and defeat in the prayer life, because for a believer it is a'step of faith' that leads to victory.

A life of 'active faith' at the feet of Jesus Christ, means to place oneself (and family) at the 'foot of the Cross' in faith, under the protective covering Blood of Jesus Christ,.. taking our requests to God in prayer (in the Name of 'Jesus'), and depending solely on God for fulfillment of His promises. That is the only place from where 'spiritual growth' can come (that vitally important and necessary "'growth in holiness'). (Heb.12:14), "Persistently strive for peace with all men, and for that growth in holiness apart from which no one will see the Lord."

Refusing to place trust on other people and plans, rather, to place trust on God alone, should never be considered 'works', because it is necessary 'faith in action'.

We must first truly 'believe' God's Word about the atonement sacrifice His Son made in our behalf (and what that sacrifice truly accomplished for us). A 'believer' will then be enabled by the Holy Spirit to 'act in obedient faith' on God's Word and 'promises' (supported by Jesus' Blood), to receive deliverance from God, (which will always include 'spiritual growth' and 'blessing'). (2 Cor. 4:4) informs us, "The god of this age (that is the devil), has blinded the minds of 'unbelievers', so that they cannot see the light of the gospel of the glory of Christ, who is the image of God."

In fulfillment of that verse, the <u>minds</u> of many <u>professed</u>
Christians <u>have been blinded</u> by Satan <u>because</u> of their <u>unbelief</u>. Some people have been <u>deceived</u> to say that a person acting in <u>'obedient faith'</u> on God's Word, is <u>'works'</u>,...and that person is trying to 'work' their way into Heaven (instead of being 'saved by <u>grace'</u> through faith on the Son of God).

They <u>say</u>, that because they are saved by the <u>grace</u> of God, they are <u>not required to obey</u> the <u>Word of God</u> (on finances, divine healing, or other instructions given in His Word). God's <u>Word</u>, however, <u>commands</u> a Christian to <u>'believe on His Son'</u>, and <u>that command</u> must be <u>faithfully obeyed</u>, because it is above everything else what God <u>requires</u> from everyone. It is the <u>one condition</u> God places on His <u>Will</u>, and <u>His plan for our Salvation</u>. (John 6:29), "This", replied, Jesus, "is <u>above all</u> the thing that God <u>requires</u>—that <u>you</u> should <u>be</u> believers in Him whom He has sent."

There is <u>direct</u> teaching in the Bible (James 1 & 2) on the subject of <u>attaining</u> <u>righteousness</u> <u>by</u> an <u>active</u> <u>faith</u> (just as Abraham did), and it clearly <u>explains how</u> an <u>active obedient</u> <u>faith</u> in God, really <u>works</u>. (James 1:22), "But be <u>doers</u> of the word, and not hearers only, deceiving yourselves."

Abraham had to truly 'believe' God's Word first, and because he did believe, he was enabled by the Spirit to 'act' in obedient faith on God's instructions (and thus become an example for us). (Gen.15:6) "Abraham believed God, and his faith was placed to his credit as righteousness." Because he believed he received righteousness from the Holy Spirit and was then able to obey and trust on God's faithfulness to His Word. God did not consider it 'works' because Abraham acted in faith on His Word, rather, Abraham became a 'child of God' because he placed his trust on God. (John 1:12) "Yet to all who received him, to those who believed in his Name, he gave the right to become children of God." (Abraham's active faith was placed to his credit as righteousness.)

Jesus told us (Matt. 5:6), "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they shall be filled. (8) Blessed are the pure in heart, for they shall see God."

In many instances a Christian will be <u>taken</u> <u>advantage</u> <u>of by others</u> (because they stand for what is right), but Jesus promised, (10) "Blessed are those who are <u>persecuted</u> for <u>righteousness'</u> sake, For theirs is the Kingdom of Heaven."

Jesus further explained that it is obedient and faithful followers who enter the Kingdom (Matt.7:21), "Not everyone who says to me, 'Master, Master', will enter the Kingdom of the Heavens, but only those who are obedient to my Father who is in Heaven." (NKJV says) "he who does the will of My Father in Heaven."

Acting in faith on God and <u>refusing</u> to <u>place trust</u> on other people and man-made plans is not a 'works religion', instead, it <u>is</u> obediently <u>doing "the will</u> of my Father in Heaven" to enter His Kingdom (just as Jesus said we <u>must 'do'</u> if we want to <u>enter there</u> through the <u>narrow gate</u>). (James 1:22) "Be <u>doers</u> of the word, and not hearers only, <u>deceiving yourselves</u>.".

It is through faith on the Son of God (not by outward good works), that we are 'saved by His grace',...and, "This is above all the thing that God requires—that you should be believers in Him whom He has sent."(replied Jesus, John 6:29) ('believe', means to trust or to have faith).

Some people think that <u>obedience</u> to <u>God's</u> <u>Word</u> is not directly connected to an <u>active</u> <u>faith</u> in His Son, but faith and obedience are <u>never separated</u> in the Bible. To label faithful obedience <u>as works</u>, is an attempt to find <u>excuse</u> for <u>unscriptural</u> ways (and <u>disobedience</u> to God's Word).

We cannot <u>separate</u> faith from <u>obedience</u> to God's Word. (1 John 3:22), "Whatever we ask for we obtain from Him, because we <u>obey</u> His commands and <u>do</u> the things which are pleasing in His sight."

We <u>first</u> have to <u>believe</u> (and <u>accept</u> that Jesus was giving us <u>God's Word</u>) (which we are to <u>obey</u>). We are to have a <u>forgiving</u> heart toward <u>those</u> who <u>dislike us</u> (Jesus said);...we are to <u>trust Him</u> financially, and to <u>scripturally</u> use the money that passes through our hands—<u>not</u> go into debt. Also, we are to trust God in Jesus' Name for healing of our body, and <u>not</u> rely on medicine and drugs; (and, to trust Him in all other issues of life).

The truth <u>is</u>, that if one <u>does not</u> truly <u>believe</u> a <u>word</u> given to them, they <u>cannot</u> faithfully <u>obey that word</u>. Faith does not work that way. This is most <u>important</u> for us to <u>understand</u>, because <u>when we believe</u> in something (or someone), we will automatically place our faith in them. <u>If</u>, (<u>by</u> God's grace and <u>guidance</u>), we can truly <u>understand</u> what Christ's <u>Atonement work</u> on the Cross accomplished for us, then we <u>will</u> take our <u>requests</u> (in faith) <u>only to</u> the foot of that Cross. Our <u>spiritual</u> growth by <u>doing this</u>, will be the most <u>important</u> result of all, (as we will <u>know</u> God <u>better</u> than before).

Faith cannot be carried out if there is <u>unbelief</u> or <u>doubt</u> in a person's <u>heart</u> about something they were told (nor could one obediently <u>do</u> as someone advised them). <u>Why</u> would a person act <u>in</u> <u>faith</u> on something if they <u>did not believe</u> it was <u>true</u>? If you <u>do not believe</u> that a mechanic can repair your vehicle, you would not have faith to take it to them. In the same way, if we <u>do not believe</u> that God <u>can</u> (nor <u>will</u>) fulfill His <u>Word</u> for us, then <u>the devil</u> will try to have us put our faith on <u>someone</u> (or <u>another plan</u>) aside from God's command to trust on Him. Trusting (or putting faith in) anything but God, however, would be showing <u>unbelief</u> in <u>God</u>, which is <u>idolatry</u> (as Paul explained), and it is a <u>disobedience</u> of God's <u>1st</u>. and <u>2nd</u>.

Commandments to have <u>no other god</u> but Him, (and to have no <u>idols</u> instead of Him). To <u>act</u> in <u>faith</u> (by placing <u>trust</u> on God alone), should <u>never</u> be called 'works', (as believers are sometimes accused of), instead, it is 'doing the will of God' via 'acting faith'.

A close union with Christ, comes through having an 'obedient faith' in God. (John 15:7-10 Jesus explained) "If you continue in me and my sayings continue in you, ask what you will, and it shall be done for you. By this is God glorified—by your bearing abundant fruit and thus being 'true disciples' of mine. As the Father has loved me, I have also loved you: continue in my love. If you obey my commands, you will continue in my love, as I have obeyed my Father's commands and continue in His love."

We can remain in that same <u>blessed position</u> as Jesus did, if we obey (keep) God's commandments. (NKJ says), "<u>abide</u> in My love. <u>If</u> you <u>keep</u> My commandments, you <u>will abide</u> in My love, just as I have kept My Father's commandments and abide in His love."

Having <u>faith</u> in Christ (and <u>believing</u> in what His Atonement <u>work</u> <u>accomplished</u> for us on the Cross), is what enables one to keep God's Word <u>first</u> in their life. It is the only <u>foundation</u> for real faith. Apostle Paul explained (Gal. 5:), that <u>outward religion</u> means <u>nothing</u>, but that an inward spiritual faith on the Word of our unseen God in

Heaven (about His <u>Son's</u> <u>atonement</u> <u>work</u> for us), should be <u>inspiring</u> for a true believer. (5-6) "For we through the Spirit eagerly wait for the <u>hope</u> of <u>righteousness</u> (by <u>faith</u>). The only thing that counts is 'faith' expressing itself through <u>love</u>."

Doing what God's Word tells us to do, is not 'works', it is faith on His Word and acting from our love for God (a desire to be a true disciple of Christ). (He said), "If you love me, you will obey my command," (John 14:15). And Jesus did command us how to do, regarding many important issues in life. Exercising an active faith in keeping God's command to trust on His Son, is not 'works', but it is an expression of obedience because of a genuine love for Christ (and our not wanting to disobey Him). The devil likes to cause confusion, by suggesting that obeying the Old Testament, and following Christ's commands in the New Testament, are both works. However, in speaking of Abraham's obedience (James 2:22 says,), "Do you see that faith was working together with his works, and by works faith was made perfect?"

We need to realize that God's 'Promises' all have 'yes' added to the end of them, and that is what we must 'believe' if we want to place our trust in God's Promises. Every time we pray for all those things which Jesus has already purchased with His own blood, those 'Promises' are saying to us, that God has already heard and answered our prayer. When we pray, we are really asking for God's mercy, which God has already extended to us through the Atonement work of His Son on the Cross. In faith, we should believe we have received the first time we pray, and not have to keep pleading for God's mercy (making the same request) because of our unbelief. It is a 'principle of Truth' that the Holy Spirit has to teach all of us. That is why the spiritual blessing received (with each answer to a prayer made in faith) is so important in the Christian life.

There are three actions of real faith; ask, believe, and receive. That is God's "plan for deliverance". After we have definitely placed our request before God (with no reservations or compromise), we should not doubt (or not believe for what we had prayed). Rather, we continue with our 'stand of faith' to receive that answer to our prayer, and, with a request to be shown why we have not received.

The <u>'condition'</u> Jesus gave for receiving our answers to prayer, is to <u>believe</u> that we have <u>already received</u> when we ask, because <u>God</u> is <u>faithful</u> to <u>His promises</u>. No matter what the situation might be, we are required to <u>take</u> a <u>risk</u> on the <u>faithfulness</u> of God's Word to us through His Son, His apostles, and <u>prophets</u> before Him. (Mark 11:24) "What things soever ye desire, when ye pray, <u>'believe'</u> that ye <u>have</u> received them (Jesus said), and ye <u>shall</u> <u>have</u> them."

Therefore, if we have <u>really believed</u> that God has heard and answered our prayer, why should we ask over and over again (for the <u>same</u> thing? the late Pastor asked). If one of our children would ask for permission to do something, and we had told them, "Yes, you may do so", .. then they would ask the same question again, .. we would

conclude that they did \underline{not} \underline{really} $\underline{believe}$ us when we had said ' $\underline{yes'}$ the first time they asked.

(1 John 5:14-15) "And we have an <u>assured confidence</u> that whenever we ask anything <u>in accordance with His will</u>, He <u>listens</u> to us. And since we <u>know</u> that He <u>listens</u> to <u>us</u>, then (whatever we ask), we <u>know</u> that we <u>have</u> the <u>things</u> which we have asked from Him." (By faith on the <u>power</u> of the <u>Atonement Blood</u> of Jesus Christ, we can have every scriptural prayer answered.)

This being <u>true</u>, <u>why should we ask</u> over and again instead of <u>believing</u> to <u>receive</u> (what we had already prayed for)? The <u>devil</u> wants us to give up the <u>Atonement right</u> that we have, to <u>pray and receive</u> by faith.

An example of this is in the case of the nobleman whose boy was sick, (John 4:46-54). He came to Jesus and first asked Him to heal his son. Jesus said, "Except ye see signs and wonders, ye will not believe." That answer did not grant the father's request, but he refused to doubt (nor to give up) on the request that he had already made. (He said in faith), "Sir, come down before my child dies." (He was still believing that his prayer would be answered). Jesus then gave the man His Word (instead of going with him), and here is where we see genuine faith' taking action, for the man believed the words of the Son of God. We want to take note of that, because if we believe God's 'written' Word, it should mean the same to us today as His 'spoken' Word meant to that man whose boy was sick.

"You may return home," replied Jesus; "your son has recovered."

He 'believed' the words of Jesus and started back home; and he was already on his way down when his servants met him and told him that his son was alive and well. So, he inquired of them at what hour he had shown improvement. "Yesterday, about seven o'clock," they replied "the fever left him." Then the boy's father recollected that that was the time at which Jesus had said to him, "Your son has recovered," and he and his whole household became believers."

That man's true 'faith <u>in action'</u>), ...<u>bore fruit</u> within his whole <u>household</u>. <u>His faith</u> was also recorded to be a <u>spiritual</u> '<u>light'</u> for others, (and for us) to <u>portray in our life</u>.

God's written Promises should mean the same to us, as if He were standing here in person telling us that He has heard and answered our prayers. We want to ask God in fervent, personal, and private prayer, to reveal the hindrance (where our faith is 'lacking'), and ask Him to strengthen our faith, just as Jesus' disciples asked Him "strengthen our weak faith".

When we truly believe $\underline{God's}$ \underline{Word} (that our prayer is answered), the \underline{second} \underline{action} of receiving through our valid 'faith' is to $\underline{rejoice}$, 'praising' and ' $\underline{thanking}$ ' \underline{God} for the deliverance (even \underline{before} we \underline{see} , \underline{feel} , (or have) the deliverance or answer to prayer).

When Jehoshaphat and God's people of Israel were surrounded by three great armies (2 Chron, 20:20-22), "Jehoshaphat stood and said, 'Hear me, O Judah and you inhabitants of Jerusalem: Believe in the

LORD your God, and you shall be established; believe His prophets, and you shall prosper.' And when he had consulted with the people, he appointed those who should sing to the LORD, and who should praise the beauty of holiness, as they went out before the army and were saying: 'Praise the LORD, For His mercy endures forever.' Now when they began to sing and to praise, the LORD set ambushes against the people of Ammon, Moab, and Mount Seir, who had come against Judah; and they were defeated." [God's people had praised God before they even saw their deliverance and victory.]

If we were in a trial (going through temptation from the devil), and we had placed the whole matter in God's hands definitely, for Him to deliver us, and we really 'BELIEVED' in our heart that we had the answer" (the Pastor asked), "how could we do anything but 'rejoice'. and thank' God. Real faith 'rejoices' in the Promises, (as much as if it sees the deliverance and is already enjoying it). This is because we truly believe on the power of the Atonement Blood of Christ, and, that it supports every promise from God.

The third action is for us to 'step out' in true faith by acting in faith, because we are 'believing' God's Word that our prayer is answered. It is 'actions of faith' (that God's Spirit inspires from within a believer) as we believe, ... because Jesus told us the Spirit He would send is for 'believers' (not unbelievers in the world). "The world cannot receive Him" (He said, John 14:17).

(James 2:14), "What good is it, my brethren, if a man <u>professes</u> to have faith, and yet his <u>actions</u> do <u>not correspond</u>? Can such faith save him? (17) Thus, also faith by itself, <u>if</u> it does not have actions is dead."

This <u>vital principal</u> is <u>not recognized</u> by multitudes of people who are <u>not acting</u> in <u>harmony with</u> their <u>professed faith</u>. The average Christian <u>claims</u> to be <u>trusting</u> and <u>believing</u> in God, but in time of temptation (and trial) they turn their <u>trust</u> to <u>other</u> things. They <u>act</u> opposite from the faith they <u>profess</u> in God, (by seeking help from many plans of man).

(In <u>summary</u>), <u>when</u> we truly <u>believe</u> (and, <u>as</u> we 'place our trust' on <u>God's</u> Promises), that will be faith <u>working</u> through our <u>love</u> and obedience to Christ. It is <u>evidence</u> that we <u>believe</u> in <u>what</u> the <u>power</u> of <u>His shed blood</u> on <u>the Cross has done</u> for us. We are <u>then</u> on our way toward having <u>conditions</u> of the Garden of Eden restored in our life, <u>because</u> God has not changed, and He will do the <u>same things</u> for us as <u>He did</u> for <u>people</u> in the Bible times (who acted in faith). <u>Everything</u> in the true Christian life <u>is</u> <u>by faith'</u>. We <u>cannot remind</u> ourselves too often of that vital truth!

When we refuse to place our trust in something else (because God told us to trust on the One whom He has sent), that is not 'outward works' (nor trying to earn our way into Heaven), because it is "by faith" that we are "saved by God's Grace". [It shows, instead, that "those who possess faith.are true sons of Abraham".]
