## DEPEND ON A 'SELF-LIFE' (OR LIVE BY THE SPIRIT)

In their Christian walk, as one comes to a better understanding of the Scriptures, they also come to realize that only two powers are working in the world to control the natural man. A person walks and acts under the power of the self-life (controlled by Satan of course), or they walk under the power and control of the Spirit (God's Holy Spirit). We need to understand the <u>contrast</u> of those two <u>opposite</u> courses to follow, and the importance of making the right <u>choice</u> to follow the <u>Holy Spirit's guidance</u>, instead of <u>efforts</u> of the <u>selflife</u>.

Jesus referred to that path as living in the flesh, which really Means the way of natural man, instead of living by the Spirit which gives Life. (John 6:63) Jesus explained "It is the <u>spirit</u> which gives Life. The flesh confers <u>no benefit</u> whatever. The <u>words</u> I have spoken to you are spirit and are <u>Life</u>. (64) "<u>But</u> there are some of you who do not believe." (Jesus said).

So, one can see that we must first <u>believe</u> Jesus words, and when a person does <u>believe</u> the Words of Jesus, then the Spirit will work within them, to enable them an understanding of His words. If one is <u>sincere</u> in their <u>commitment</u> to follow <u>Jesus</u> in their life, instead of the ways of man, then an understanding of Jesus' <u>words</u> (given by the Spirit), enables them to know what <u>God's will is</u>, and will enable one's sincere heart to follow the Spirit and <u>do</u> '<u>God's will</u>' in their life.

In <u>saying</u>, "the flesh profits nothing" (NKJV), or "the flesh <u>confers</u> <u>no</u> <u>benefit</u>" (Wey.), Jesus was saying, that for one to follow the <u>ways</u> <u>of man</u> (or <u>the world</u>), there is no profit nor benefit. That was a wonderful thing for Jesus to tell His followers, for it <u>draws</u> <u>aside the veil</u> and <u>reveals</u> where <u>all the trouble</u> in the world originated (and of course, where all trouble still originates).

The ways of the flesh' (self-efforts of mankind) bring us <u>no</u> profit nor benefit <u>spiritually</u>, nor do they help us with the health of our bodies, nor benefit us in our homes, nor in financial matters. Everything we <u>thought</u> we would <u>gain</u> by following the ways of man, will eventually be <u>lost</u>, and the end result would be <u>no gain</u> whatever ...(most importantly, no spiritual gain).

It would be like a person starting out in business with a hundred dollars and every day they suffer some loss (the Pastor said), thus, very quickly they would have nothing left. That is why Jesus wanted to bring out this Truth very clearly, and why He said, "The Words I have spoken to you are spirit and they are <u>Life</u>." That is Life (with a capital L) meaning Eternal Life, of course.

So, <u>when</u> we take Jesus at His <u>Word</u> and <u>believe</u> in Him, we do <u>not</u> <u>lose</u> everything (spiritually or otherwise) as the result would be when following the plans of man.

Apostle Paul admonished the Galatians for falling back from obedient faith to the self-life (Gal. 3:3), "Are you so <u>foolish</u>? Having <u>begun</u> by the <u>Spirit</u>, are you now going to reach perfection through what is external?" (Trusting in plans of the self-life). When God answers our prayers and works miracles in our behalf, is it not the result of our having heard and <u>believed</u> (or trusted in God ?)... <u>like</u> faithful Abraham. (Gal.3:6-7) "even as Abraham <u>believed</u> God, and his <u>faith</u> was <u>placed</u> to <u>his account</u> as <u>righteousness</u>?" (As <u>God</u> said to Abraham, Genesis 15:6). Notice therefore that those who possess <u>faith</u> ... are <u>true</u> sons of Abraham. (apostle Paul said). (Do we not want to be true sone in the faith??)

Having <u>faith in</u> or <u>trusting in</u> <u>someone</u>, or some <u>plan</u>, or <u>some-</u> <u>thing</u>, <u>is believing in</u> that person, or plan, or thing. When we <u>say</u> we are trusting in God, while at the same time we are using, or agreeing to some human plan or remedy of man, then that is not believing in faith for what we need or want to have within God's will.

The apostle James confirmed what Paul said (James 2:14) "What good is it, my brethren, if a man professes to have faith, and yet his <u>actions do not</u> correspond? <u>Can</u> such faith save him?"(Vs 17)"In the same way, faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead."

So, we have everything to <u>gain</u> spiritually and in every other way, with Eternal <u>Life</u> as our final <u>reward</u>, for <u>believing</u> <u>in</u> <u>Jesus</u>, and <u>continuing</u> to <u>follow</u> <u>in</u> <u>faith</u> the <u>pathway</u> of Christ Jesus, who always did His Father's will.

(Hebrews 10:), after explaining that Christ's eternal sacrifice had done away with sin (in vs 9), "He" (meaning Christ) then added "I have come to do Thy will" (O God).

Jesus instructed His followers (that includes us) that they must have the same commitment to His Father as <u>He</u> did Himself, "Not everyone who says to Me, 'Lord, Lord,' shall enter the kingdom of heaven, but he who <u>does</u> the will of <u>My</u> Father in heaven." (Matt.7:21) And, He explained (John 14:6), "I am the <u>Way</u>, and the <u>Truth</u> and the <u>Life</u>. No one comes to the Father <u>except</u> through me."

The "pathway of faith and active obedience", is the "pathway of Christ" that we want to see ourselves following. Sometimes we need to 'take a look at' our <u>decisions</u> and the <u>commitments</u> we have made, and with the Holy Spirit's help, <u>determine</u> <u>if we</u> are <u>doing</u> God's will (or <u>is our trust</u> (or faith) centered on something or someone else. We need to <u>ask</u> some <u>questions</u> <u>of</u> <u>ourselves</u> and give ourselves <u>honest</u> <u>answers</u>, to see if we are really believing.

(2 Cor.13:5) tells us to "Test yourselves to discover whether you

are true <u>believers</u>: put your own selves under <u>examination</u>. Or <u>do you</u> <u>not know</u> that Jesus Christ <u>is within</u> you unless you are <u>in</u>sincere?"

How do we know what Gods will (or His way) is? The divine way is found in God's Word. Jesus told us that there is no profit in anything in the world, but profit (or benefit) can be found in His Word— The Words that He <u>spoke</u>. So, the <u>divine</u> way to <u>decide</u> and the path to follow in one's life, is found in the Word of God, <u>not</u> by following in the <u>ways</u> and <u>plans</u> of man, for there is no lasting benefit with anything of the world. However, <u>life-giving</u> benefits are found in God=s Word when one <u>heeds</u> and follows it, for Jesus said, "they are Spirit, and they are Life."

The <u>most</u> important <u>loss</u> of all is the <u>spiritual gain</u> that one will have <u>lost</u>, by trying <u>stubbornly</u> to follow the <u>will</u> of the <u>selflife</u>, instead of submitting to the leading of the <u>Holy Spirit</u> and coming to <u>know</u> God better than we did before. The spiritual <u>gain</u> that one would <u>lose</u>, can be referred to as growth in holiness which is <u>ever</u> <u>so important</u> (as the Spirit-inspired writer to Hebrews brought out.) (Hebr.12:14), "Persistently <u>strive</u> for peace with all men, <u>and for</u> that growth in holiness apart from which no one will see the Lord."

[Striving for growth in holiness is <u>not works</u> (as one may be <u>deceived to think</u>). Rather, it is a very <u>necessary part</u> of the true Christian's life in Christ— to be <u>like</u> <u>Christ</u> by <u>doing</u> His Father's will (as the Holy Spirit <u>directs</u> us to do from God's Word), and so, we be prepared to meet Christ in the air when He comes again.] (through "that growth in holiness apart from which no one will see the Lord.")

The writer is saying, persistently <u>strive</u> to <u>understand</u> the <u>will</u> of <u>God</u> and <u>do</u> it, for <u>'spiritual</u> <u>gain'</u> or <u>growth</u> we receive from doing God's will. We are to <u>follow</u> the leading of the Spirit, and <u>'make</u> <u>straight</u> paths for your feet" (says vs.13), and "be carefully <u>on</u> your <u>guard</u> lest there be anyone who falls back from the <u>grace</u> of God." (vs15)

The spiritual gain that one <u>forfeits</u>, by following the will of a <u>self-life</u>, is <u>lost</u> or <u>wasted</u> <u>time</u> in a true Christian's <u>life</u> <u>of</u> <u>faith</u>. We are told to run the Christian race with patient <u>endurance</u>, "simply fixing our gaze upon Jesus, our Prince Leader in the faith, who <u>will</u> also award us the prize." (vs.1-2).

That is to be <u>our reward</u> for <u>allowing</u> ourselves to <u>be</u> <u>led</u> <u>by</u> the Spirit, and <u>following</u> <u>Jesus</u> with spiritual blessing <u>included</u>, instead of following the natural self-will of man, or efforts of the flesh, with no benefit whatever, as Jesus said.

Using the example of Esau (who parted from the will of God to get what he wanted via his own self-will, and thus, lost the blessing of 'spiritual gain or growth that he could have received from steadfast faith), the writer warns, that, Esau "found no opportunity for undoing what he had done, though he sought the blessing earnestly with tears."

(He could not <u>make up for</u> the <u>spiritual</u> growth that <u>he</u> <u>forfeited</u> by following the will of the self-life, <u>instead</u> <u>of</u> that of the Spirit.)

Apostle Paul referred to 'living in the flesh' (or ways of man), which carries every evil thing with it, and ends in destruction and the Lake of Fire, as opposite to living a life of faith guided by the Holy Spirit with Eternal Life as the result.

(Romans 8:6-8), "Following after the Holy Spirit leads to Life and <u>peace</u>, but following after the <u>old nature</u> leads to <u>death</u>, <u>because</u> the old sinful nature within us is <u>against</u> God. It <u>never did obey</u> God's laws and it never will. That's why those who are still under the control of their old <u>sinful</u> selves, bent on following their old evil desires, can never please God."

God spoke through the prophet (Isaiah 55:8-9) "For My thoughts are not your thoughts, Nor are your ways My ways," says the Lord. "For <u>as the heavens</u> are <u>higher</u> than the <u>earth</u>, So, are My ways higher than your ways, And My thoughts than your thoughts."

This is a very important Truth (the Pastor said), to <u>understand</u> that <u>our</u> good actions and ways of the self-life, <u>do</u> <u>not</u> <u>make</u> <u>us</u> <u>righteous</u> <u>before</u> <u>God</u>. God enabled Job and Cornelius to realize that, <u>after</u> they <u>gave</u> <u>up</u> <u>their</u> <u>self-will</u> and <u>submitted</u> <u>to</u> the <u>leading</u> of His Spirit). God made this very plain and emphasized it in both the Old and New Testaments. (Prov.16:25), "Before every man there lies a <u>wide</u> and <u>pleasant</u> road that he <u>thinks</u> is right (<u>to</u> the natural man, <u>not</u> to the <u>spiritually minded</u> <u>man</u>, the Pastor said), <u>but</u> it <u>ends</u> in death." (Even) "Hunger is good—if it makes you work to satisfy it!" (vs.26).

However, (Prov.3:) speaks about the <u>pleasant rewards</u> of allowing ourselves to be guided in our ways by <u>the wisdom of 'God's Spirit'</u> instead of following <u>our own stubborn self-will</u>, (vs.17-18) "Her ways are <u>pleasant</u> ways, and all her paths <u>are peace</u>. She is a tree of life to <u>those who embrace</u> her; those who lay hold of her <u>will be blessed</u>." And, Psalm 40:4), "<u>Happy</u> the man who <u>trusts in</u> the Eternal, who pays no heed to loud and <u>false apostates</u>." (Apostates are 'backsliders' from the faith, <u>unbelievers</u> who are trusting in <u>everything else but</u> <u>God</u> for things and circumstances in life, even though in selfrighteousness, they <u>profess</u> to be believers, and they call out in Christ's Name.)

This is illustrated plainly in the Bible, which shows clearly the difference between self-life (or flesh) and Spirit. Jesus had to admit that the scribes and Pharisees <u>appeared</u> to be righteous unto <u>men</u>. They appeared to be beautiful Christians outwardly.

In the case of Job, "If there ever was a man who tried to serve God, it was Job." Even the writer of the book of Job, had to admit that Job was righteous, <u>humanly speaking</u>; (the Pastor said) — but it was all the result of <u>human efforts</u> of <u>the self-life</u>. His righteous acts were all done in the flesh, although they seemed to be most sincere and honest efforts that a human being could make. But (it <u>was</u> <u>only an outward show of religion</u>, and) it <u>did not please</u> <u>God</u> in the least.

We hear of many people taking the <u>same attitude</u> today, he said. And I heard a sister who was faced with many problems, say, I think, if there is anyone the Lord should help, it is me. We told her, Athat attitude <u>will not help you</u> the <u>least bit</u>. God came to help sinners (not people who think they are good and righteous). (Matt.9:13) Jesus said, "I did not come to call the righteous, but sinners to repentance."

[We can "The Pharisee, standing erect, prayed as follows by himself: "'O God, I thank Thee that I am not like other people—I am not a thief nor a cheat nor an adulterer, nor do I even resemble this tax-gatherer. I fast twice a week. I pay the tithe on all my gains." "But the tax-gatherer, standing far back, would not so much as lift his eyes to Heaven, but kept beating his breast and saying, "O God, be reconciled to me, sinner that I am." "I tell you (Jesus said), that this man went home more thoroughly absolved from guilt than the other; for every one who uplifts himself will be humbled, but he who humbles himself will be uplifted."]

Job's self-righteous <u>attitude</u> eventually <u>robbed</u> him of everything he had. Even his wife and children would not respect him, and it almost cost him his life (except for <u>God's merciful love</u>). It was not the hurricane nor the bands of Chaldeans that robbed Job, rather, it was because of what God says in the New Testament, "the flesh (or self-life) profits nothing." It will eventually mean the loss of everything, <u>if we are not willing to repent</u>, as Job did. "Therefore, I abhor myself, And <u>repent</u> in dust and ashes." (Job 42:6)

What Job was saying (the Pastor explained) was, "I give up <u>my</u> ways, <u>my</u> efforts, <u>my</u> plans, and I <u>allow Thee</u> to have <u>Thy</u> way with me. I allow <u>Thy plan</u> to <u>prevail</u> in my life and begin to live by the Spirit (instead of self). I desire to <u>have no more</u> of the self-life." As a result of that new and right attitude, <u>God turned</u> Job's captivity around (and delivered him from the bondage and control of the selflife). [ Apostle Paul spoke of that bondage (Rom.7:21) saying, "I find therefore the law of my self-nature to be that when I desire to do what is right, evil is lying in ambush for me.']

So, Job (before that was written in the New Testament), <u>learned</u> <u>that God's words "are Spirit</u> and <u>are Life." Life</u> and <u>peace</u> that comes from following the <u>Holy Spirit</u>, does <u>not mean</u> a good feeling while you are in the Church meeting room (and then all sorts of trouble to face when you get home.) But it means, that with an inner peace <u>that God</u> <u>bestows</u>, nothing should disturb us or cause us to worry or be anxious (even when we are tempted). When we are truly <u>trusting</u> in <u>God</u>, then we know, and we really are believing that God is in control for us). Everything can go to suit us, and be easy and pleasant for us, when we are following the Spirit of Christ. (John 14:1) "Let not your hearts be troubled. Trust in God: trust in Me also."

That is not the case when one is living in the flesh (meaning under the <u>carnal nature of</u> the <u>self-life</u>), for Jesus said, "It is the Spirit which gives Life." (capitol L on Life). "The flesh confers <u>no</u> <u>benefit</u> whatever," He said. Therefore, anything we gain in the way of a self-life is <u>not</u> permanent nor is it lasting— as it is when we are guided by the Holy Spirit to act and decide things in our life.

We are told(Rom.8:13-14) "For if you so live(meaning in the flesh) death is near but <u>if</u>, through being under the <u>sway of the</u> <u>Spirit</u>, you are putting your <u>old</u> bodily <u>habits</u> to death, you will live. For <u>those</u> who are <u>led</u> by <u>God's</u> <u>Spirit</u> are, <u>all</u> <u>of</u> <u>them</u>, <u>God's</u> <u>sons</u>."

To be <u>God's sons</u> is to be <u>accepted</u> by <u>Him as sons because</u> we <u>are</u> willing to be <u>led</u> and <u>guided</u> by <u>His</u> <u>Spirit</u> to follow the example and pathway that His Son has set for us to follow. When <u>God</u> says, "through <u>being under the sway of the Spirit</u>, <u>you will live</u>", <u>means</u> that <u>He</u> will <u>not reject</u> us and say "begone from me, I never knew you."

Instead, we will live with Christ just as He told us, "Because I live, you also will live", (John 14:19). Also (John 10:27-28), "My sheep listen to my voice, and I know them, and they follow me. I give them the Life of the Ages, and they shall never, never perish, nor shall any one wrest them from my hand."

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SOME MAIN POINTS OF: "DEPEND ON SELF-LIFE OR SPIRIT? (250R) (S9R) :

1./ The need for a true Christian to understand that the self-life (carnal nature) that each one has been born with <u>since Adam</u>, is under the control of Satan, <u>not</u> the control of the Holy Spirit... (and there is no <u>middle</u> ground with only two powers to control).

2./ Following the <u>will of self</u> (our own plans and efforts) to gain things we want in this life, only has <u>temporary</u> results, <u>and</u> has <u>no</u> <u>spiritual value</u> <u>whatever</u>, Jesus told us.

3./ Also, that a person's <u>good</u> actions done in a <u>self-righteous</u> spirit, are not acceptable in God's sight.

4./ The example of Job is used to explain this, and how he had to <u>lose</u> everything he had gotten via his own self-will, ...and, how, <u>after</u> Job <u>repented</u>, God delivered him from his self-righteousness, and bestowed His <u>peace</u> and every blessing on Job and his family.

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
