## God's Place of True Rest/ His Provisions

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In God's Word familiar things are used to explain <u>spiritual</u> Truths, ... (a 'vine' and its 'branches', John 15), or, a <u>'nest'</u> for <u>rest</u> (Duet.32:11-12) "As an eagle stirs up its nest, Hovers over its young, Spreading out its wings, taking them up, Carrying them on its wings, So the <u>Lord alone</u> led him (Israel), And <u>there was no foreign god with him</u>."

Those analogies <u>illustrate</u> the <u>place</u> of true <u>'rest'</u> under <u>God's</u> watchful care, that 'believers' are <u>privileged</u> to have in a relationship with God and His Son, for He said that "<u>He</u> is the vine, <u>we</u> are the branches. The <u>Holy Spirit</u> will give spiritual <u>understanding</u> of all these illustrations, if one will follow Jesus words (vs.4) "<u>Abide</u> in Me, and I in you. As the 'branch <u>cannot</u> bear fruit of <u>itself'</u>, unless it abides in the vine, neither can you, unless you abide in Me."

We <u>abide in Christ</u> through <u>believing</u> in His 'promises', and, believing on God's 'Salvation Message' (which tells us <u>what</u> Christ's Atonement work on the Cross <u>has done for us</u>). <u>God will then enable us to bear 'spiritual fruit'.</u>

Our 'resting place' (through faith in Christ), is like a 'nest' to take refuge in (despite difficult conditions in the world). That 'true resting place' (that He, (GOD) offers to all true 'believers'), includes all the provisions that He has in store for those who will abide in (and keep) their faith in Him. Each blessing carries 'spiritual fruit' with it.

When we first <u>come to</u> a <u>knowledge of God</u>, we <u>are unable</u> (in our own ability) to understand spiritual Truth, and unable to <u>follow</u> the <u>directions</u> that God gives <u>in</u> His Word. Thus, the <u>human</u> heart wants to provide for its own 'nest' (or 'resting <u>place</u>'). (Paul explained (1 Cor.10), that <u>we</u> are <u>like</u> the Israelites in the desert (when they <u>grumbled</u> and <u>complained</u>, <u>instead</u> of keeping <u>faith</u> in God to <u>provide</u>, ...despite the <u>miracles</u> they had seen Him work <u>for</u> them.) So, God has to dump <u>us</u> <u>from</u> <u>our</u> 'nest' to prove our faith, and as a means of <u>spiritual</u> growth for us,...(<u>and</u> that is <u>when</u> <u>we</u> make <u>'progress'</u> in the 'Christian life').

The <u>Vine</u> and its <u>branches</u> is a <u>valuable</u> illustration of the <u>importance</u> of our <u>staying connected</u> through <u>faith</u> to the <u>true</u> Vine (Jesus Christ), so that we <u>can progress</u>. <u>Most importantly</u> (and we should be <u>thankful</u>), it is the only <u>way</u> we <u>grow in faith</u> in this life (as God prepares us for Eternal Life). (James 1:2-4 says) "My brethren, count it all <u>joy</u> when you fall into various trials, knowing that the <u>testing</u> of your <u>faith</u> produces <u>patience</u>. But <u>let</u> patience have <u>its</u> perfect work, that you may <u>be perfect</u> and <u>complete</u>, <u>lacking nothing</u>."

(1 Cor.10:) reveals that the Israelites were not complete in faith), for "they drank of that <u>spiritual Rock</u> that followed them and that <u>Rock was "Christ"</u>. <u>But with most of them... God was not well pleased for their bodies were scattered in the wilderness."</u>

That was written as an <u>admonition</u> for <u>us</u> to <u>take heed</u>, <u>not</u> to allow worldly <u>things</u> to become idols to us, and not to follow <u>evil</u> <u>ways</u> of others in the world. (Vs. 6-7) "Now these things occurred as <u>examples</u> to <u>keep</u> us <u>from</u> setting our hearts on evil things as they did. "Do not be <u>idolaters</u>, as some of them were" as it is written: "The people sat down to eat and drink, and (then) got up to dance." (NIV says) "indulge in pagan revelry".

(Vs. 8), "Nor may we be <u>fornicators</u>, like some of them who <u>committed</u> fornication and on a single day 23,000 of them fell dead."

(12) "All this kept <u>happening</u> to them with a figurative meaning; but it was put <u>on record</u> by way of admonition to <u>us, upon whom the ends of the Ages</u> have come. So then, let him who <u>'thinks</u> he is standing <u>securely'</u>, ... 'beware of falling'."

Human nature will still react the same (if we are not familiar with God's Word). When we first come to a knowledge of God's Truth, we can be fearful in going through difficult circumstances because of not knowing what God's presence should mean to us. We must study God's Word, and ask for enlightenment from the Holy Spirit, to really understand His 'Salvation Message' about what the Atonement work of Christ on the Cross has accomplished for us. If we will study the Word and follow it, God will soon teach us that He is "a refuge and strength, a very present help in time of trouble." (Psalm 46:1).

As we take a position of 'trust' on God's written Promises,  $\underline{\text{He}}$  will enable us to learn what His  $\underline{\text{presence}}$  really means, and HE enables us to enter into our Atonement rights by a 'life of faith' at the feet of Jesus which  $\underline{\text{is}}$  a  $\underline{\text{necessity}}$   $\underline{\text{in}}$  the  $\underline{\text{Christian}}$   $\underline{\text{life}}$ .

The natural heart, however, wants to 'rest where we are', and not make spiritual progress (via "tests of faith"). Human nature does not want to be dumped out of its nest (so to speak), but God (a perfect Teacher), knows what is best in order for us to advance in a Christian 'life of faith'. God alone knows how fast He can take us along that road (the 'pathway if faith') that prepares us to meet His Son.

God knows all about those 'false resting places' that we like to stay in, and He also knows this is not a true rest. Spiritual progress is hindered when we (by efforts of 'self'), deliberately take ourselves out of a 'place of trust' on God. Paul explained to the Thessalonians, that 'God' "has chosen you for Salvation, through...the Spirit's sanctifying influence, and your 'belief' in the Truth" (not belief in our "place of trust".)

God in His mercy will have to dump us out of 'our nest', so that we can learn how to bear 'spiritual fruit' (as He leads us to His 'true Resting Place'). "If any one does not continue in me" (Jesus said), "he is like the unfruitful branch which is at once thrown away and then withers. Such branches they gather up and throw into the fire and they are burned." We must bear spiritual fruit while striving for

that "growth in holiness apart from which no one will see the Lord." (says, Heb.12:14).

We would like to  $\underline{\text{think}}$  we have all the  $\underline{\text{spiritual}}$   $\underline{\text{light}}$  we need, (always have good health, money for expenses, and all temporal needs supplied,  $\underline{\text{from}}$  'seen  $\underline{\text{sources'}}$  (rather than to exercise faith in God); But that 'misplaced trust' would be ' $\underline{\text{idolatry'}}$  (which  $\underline{\text{has}}$   $\underline{\text{to}}$  be  $\underline{\text{removed}}$  from our heart).

God's <u>love</u> for us is <u>so intense</u>, that <u>He</u> wants to remove every <u>false</u> resting place, and bring us to His <u>true</u> 'resting place', ... (which results in happiness now (by faith) while <u>in this life</u>, <u>and</u> for our Eternal Life).

God used extreme measures to deliver Elijah from Israel's idolatry of a false 'place of trust', ... by allowing a famine of 3½ years. (1 Kings 17:1) "As the Lord God of Israel lives, before whom I stand, there shall not be dew nor rain these years, except at my word." Elijah was a true child of God, however, and he had given his life to God (as every Christian must do). God was teaching and leading him (as He wants to do with us), (if we will allow Him).

If we 'believe' on the promises in God's Word, He has an escape for us out of any kind of trouble. It does not matter where it comes from, or what kind of problem it is, God's Word always has a plan for the deliverance and protection of those who will trust Him (through 'believing' His Word).

Elijah believed God's Word, so he acted in faith, and God took care of him during the famine (vs.2-5) "Then the word of the Lord came to him, saying, "Get away from here and turn eastward, and hide by the Brook Cherith, which flows into the Jordan. And it will be that you shall drink from the brook, and I have commanded the ravens to feed you there."

Because Elijah believed God's Word, he was able to do according to the word, so he stayed by the Brook Cherith. It is the same with us. Our faith will always be in who (or what) we believe in (and that is where we will place our trust). We believe either the Lord's Word (or the devil's lies).

Placing our trust in the <u>wrong</u> place (depending on some thing or someone else besides God) is a form of idolatry, and God will have to reveal that idol in our life (to prepare us for our <u>goal</u> of 'Eternal Life'.)

Even though Elijah was a 'child of God', he had to be <u>tested</u> in <u>his</u> faith (the same as God has to test every believer today). (Vs.7 says), "And it happened after a while that the brook <u>dried up</u>, because there had been no rain in the land." Even the ravens <u>stopped</u> feeding him, so that was the end of Elijah's 'seen source' of supplies.

We would (at first), be upset and worried about a situation like that (if the source of supplies for <u>our</u> family was shut off). And, God did not find the <u>same means</u> of supply for Elijah, <u>but God had a 'way of escape'</u> for him (just as He does for us, <u>if we do not turn to some seen</u> 'source of supply').

When the bottom drops out of something  $\underline{we}$  are 'trusting in',  $\underline{God}$  always has something better for us (and more valuable than any loss

suffered). It <u>is just</u> a <u>test for us</u> to hold steady, and to trust only in  $\underline{\text{Him}}$  for the things we need. By <u>remaining faithful</u>, He will lead us to a better divine source, and the <u>spiritual blessing</u> of coming to really know God is something of which value cannot be put into words.

God gave Elijah the <u>next step</u> to <u>train</u> him in a '<u>life</u> of <u>trust</u> and <u>obedience'</u>. "Arise, go to Zarephath, which belongs to Sidon, and dwell there. See, I have commanded a widow there to provide for you."

Again, Elijah believed God, so he obeyed Him (and he went to Zarephath). He said to the widow (who told him she only had a handful of meal and a little oil in a jar, by which to bake a cake for her and her son, before they would die of starvation) "Do not fear; go and do as you have said, but make me a small cake from it first, and bring it to me; and afterward make some for yourself and your son. For thus says the Lord God of Israel: 'The bin of flour shall not be used up, nor shall the jar of oil run dry, until the day the Lord sends rain on the earth.'"

That widow also believed the word from the Lord (through Elijah), so she was able to act in faith on His Word (and the Lord did not fail His 'Promise'.(vs.15-16), "So she went away and did according to the word of Elijah; and she and he and her household ate for many days. The bin of flour was not used up, nor did the jar of oil run dry, according to the word of the Lord which He spoke by Elijah." The spiritual fruit that Elijah bore, became a 'Christian light' to shine for others (as Jesus said that ours should shine) for it carried over to the widow and to her son.

Elijah was called to exercise a high quality of faith on God, but he had surrendered his life right, and he was enabled to meet the test of his faith in God, right. He, (like Abraham, whom God had already declared 'righteous'), still had to be tested in faith to the highest degree. In both cases their lives were at stake (not to mention their 'eternal life'). Both were in the most valuable place that any human being could possibly be in; a place where only the living God could be trusted in to deliver them.

But God had a way of escape for them (just as He does for us). He gives to us that same privilege of exercising faith in Him, as He gave Elijah. This privilege always includes a valuable spiritual blessing, and (most importantly), a true preparation for Eternal Life also results. Anyone today can look for those same results when we exercise the same faith. "He who continues in me and in whom I continue, ...bears abundant fruit," (John 15:5).

Having no human being to depend on (aside from God), led to the glorious event of Elijah being taken up to Heaven by God (without experiencing death). That is what Elijah's 'preparation by God' in this life, meant to him,... and, we must remember that only those who are prepared by the sanctifying work of the Holy Spirit, and who are ready (with their 'lamps of faith lit') to meet Christ,...will be "caught up with Him in the air" (to be "forever with the Lord").

We need to <u>realize</u> that <u>when</u> <u>we lose</u> any <u>earthly</u> thing that we have <u>depended</u> <u>on</u>, God will lead us to something far more <u>spiritually</u> <u>valuable</u> to take its place. We will finally come to where we are

really able to <u>rest in God</u>, and to find that true "rest that remains for the people of God." (as Heb.4:9 tells us). It is a 'true <u>rest'</u> where we can be happy, <u>victorious</u>, and protected, and prepared (by God) to receive Eternal Life.

(The late Pastor said) "one of the most trying things in my Christian life, was when I would get a noticeable victory in some way, and I'd have God's 'rest' (it seemed), but I could not hold onto it. The harder I tried to hold on the quicker I lost it, because it was a false 'resting place'. I was resting on 'good feelings', and on an 'outward rest' that never lasted. I felt very bad when it fell through, but then I learned to trust God for His true 'resting place'. It must have troubled God for me to lose the oasis I had been enjoying (he said), but it was the most valuable thing that could happen to me. We would never find the true 'resting place', if God did not allow us to experience a false one."

"A lot of people think they are <u>at rest</u> under a Church membership and in outward morality and righteousness. However, <u>unless</u> a person is filled with the Holy Spirit, that comfort and rest won't last", (because the devil will use <u>discouragement</u> and <u>discontent</u> of <u>every kind</u>, to <u>try to rob us of our comfort</u>, and our <u>Atonement right</u> to enjoy God's peace).

"Being 'born again' and <u>filled with the Holy Spirit</u>, are only <u>'steps'</u> in the true Christian life, nevertheless, they are vitally <u>necessary</u> and <u>valuable</u> steps. We have to be taught, trained, and developed by God's Holy Spirit, until <u>He enables us to pass through every false</u> 'resting place' (by <u>resisting in faith</u>, the temptations devised by the devil to be trusted on).

We must get rid of that 'nest' where the human heart wants to relax... and come to where we are truly in God's will (and enjoying His 'rest'). God is the only true 'resting place', and we can only come to it by faith on the Atonement work of His Son. Any other 'resting place' will only be temporary.

However, we will suffer no real <u>harm</u> if we are <u>willing</u> to be rid of those 'nests' of ours...(because some prime <u>'lessons</u> of <u>faith'</u> will be <u>learned</u>). Also, many <u>questions</u> will be answered for us, while we are going through those false resting places, <u>and</u> the end result will be, that "all things work together for good to those who love God."

God knows how to remove those  $\underline{\text{false}}$  'places of trust' without our suffering any serious loss, and He  $\underline{\text{wants}}$  to  $\underline{\text{replace}}$  them with something better for us, spiritually. So, He has to deal with  $\underline{\text{us}}$ , (as He did with His people in Bible times).

God says of <u>His people</u>, "As an eagle stirs up its nest, Hovers over its young, Spreading out its wings, taking them up, Carrying them on its wings, So the <u>Lord alone led him</u>, And there was no foreign god with him." (Duet. 32:11-12). (A 'foreign god' could be anything else that we trust on.) That is how the Lord teaches true 'believers' (and how he prepares them for His true 'Resting Place').

The mother eagle throws the eaglets out of  $\underline{\text{their}}$  comfortable nest, because she  $\underline{\text{understands}}$  them, and knows that they will never  $\underline{\text{learn}}$  to  $\underline{\text{fly}}$  if they stay settled in a nest. When she throws them out,

they get excited because they are falling, and they begin to flutter their wings (which causes the wings to <u>develop</u>, just as <u>we need</u> to <u>develop</u> in <u>our faith</u>). While they are learning, she swoops under them, catches them, and brings them back to the nest (until <u>the next lesson</u>). Soon they learn to fly, and the <u>heavens</u> are their domain, as they go from peak to peak (instead of remaining in a perishable nest).

We can be <u>sure</u> that God doesn't want us to remain in ignorance (of Him), as we try to take refuge in <u>our 'nest'</u> that <u>we create for ourselves</u> (<u>by our own efforts</u>). So, He lets things we are trusting in, be destroyed. The bottom drops out of them, so that we might learn to <u>know Him</u>, to <u>trust in Him</u> (and to come to <u>the true</u> 'resting place' that <u>He has</u> for us). That is the <u>spiritual lesson</u> every Christian <u>must learn when they surrender their life to God</u>. When our 'flowing stream' dries up <u>our nests are taken from us</u>, and the <u>things</u> that we are depending on, fail us, then we can <u>learn to trust wholly and completely on God</u>. We can have better things than we ever thought possible, and far superior to anything we have lost (or that we have given up to trust God). \*(Jesus said, there is no one who has given up things for the Kingdom of God's sake) "who shall not receive many times more in this present time, and in the age to come <u>Eternal Life</u>."\*

Most importantly, when we receive anything in God's divine way, it always carries a spiritual blessing that enables us to "know God better". (John 17:3, Jesus informed us of how important that is for a believer to enter into Eternal Life). "Now 'this' is eternal life:" (He said), "that they may 'know you', the only true God, and Jesus Christ, whom you have sent."

SOME MAIN POINTS OF "GOD'S PROVISIONS & TRUE RESTING PLACE":

- 1. God will eliminate human sources of supplies & help in the life a believer, to remove  $\underline{false}$  resting places, so ' $\underline{spiritual}$   $\underline{progress'}$  can be made by tests we meet.
- 2. Abiding 'in Christ' as we are led to trust fully on Him for everything, is the only true 'resting place', ... and the place where we can be prepared by God to receive "Eternal Life".
- 3. "And in this consists the 'Life of the Ages', ...in knowing Thee, the only true God and Jesus Christ whom thou hast sent." ... (that means "Eternal Life".) (John 17:3)

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
